

### PHOENIX ENJOYED MY SOLDIER GIRL BETTER'N GOING UP

"My Soldier Girl," a musical comedy of a high order presented by Messrs. La Combe and Fiescher, furnished a tuncful and snappy little entertainment at the Columbia Sunday afternoon and night, and gave Phoenix showgoers an opportunity to revel in mirth and melody of the lighter sort for about the first time in the current theatrical season. "My Soldier Girl," which some of the patrons pronounced better than "Going Up" of a week ago, and at least from the standpoint of melody and pretty girls, it was the equal of any company which has appeared locally for many seasons. The plot, in common with the plots of any number of musical comedies, was of a vague sort which is exceedingly difficult to keep track of, although nobody expects production of this sort. The opening scene was laid in a New York roof garden and detailed the manner in which the personnel of the cast had been broken up by the entry of this country into the war, even the chorus girls passing up their jobs in favor of places in the ranks of the feminine aviators. Misses Leona Slatoff and Loretta Elgin, to whom had been assigned the lead feminine roles, were both clever singers and fair to look upon to a high degree and the major portion of the musical interola-

tions fell to these talented young women. The comedy element of the play—an element of no inconsiderable proportions—was turned over in a most satisfactory manner to Happy Lawson and Billy Moore, the latter in blackface and the first named in the capacity of a theatrical call boy who could and did recite poetry at the slightest provocation. Lawson, who traveled under the stage name of Jasper Peebles, devoted a huge share of his patter to roasting the Arizona bootleggers and the Burk Burnett corporations, and the audience was left with the impression that the dusky Jasper had dropped wads of his green bouquet to both of these types of citizenry.

"Are bootleggers plentiful in the parts of Arizona from which you came?" the negro was asked. "Plentiful," responded the coon. "Why man, they're so plentiful around Phoenix that they have to wear badges to keep from selling to one another." Phoenix (Arizona) Gazette.

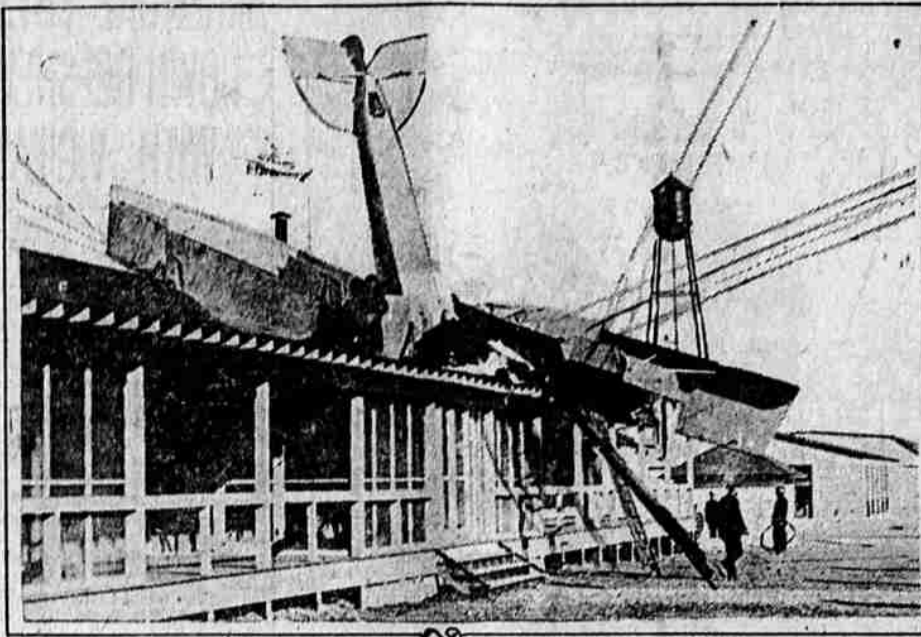
### JLWS PROTEST AGAINST ATROCITIES IN POLAND

New YORK, May 5.—A cablegram protesting against "horrible atrocities committed against Jews in Poland and Galicia," and urging action by the peace conference to prevent further pogroms has been sent to President Wilson by a committee representing five hundred thousand Jews co-religionists in America.

"According to reports," declared the message, "outrages against Jews in Poland are part of a policy to suppress the just demands of Polish Jews for equal civil, political and national rights."

### LABOR CONDITIONS IN COUNTRY MUCH IMPROVED

WASHINGTON, May 5.—Unemployment conditions showed an improvement in the week ending April 26, on the basis of reports from 58 cities, the federal employment service reports. Thirty-five cities re-

ported a total surplus of 82,600, a decrease of several thousand from the total of the previous week, while six reported a shortage totalling 2450 and 20 showed an equality of supply and demand.

The surplus showed a decrease for the first time in the Pacific coast states.

### SHORT HORN SALE IN EASTERN OREGON IS BIG SUCCESS

LA GRANDE, Ore., May 5.—A consignment Short Horn sale and show which, as an initial effort in eastern Oregon, brought higher average prices than the first Short Horn sale in Portland, was held here last week by the Pacific Northwest Short Horn Breeders' Association.

"This missionary semi-annual sale ranks with sales of long establishment in the west," declared General Manager Brown of Carlton, after the show. Because it was entirely new to the district much concern was felt for the success of the sale. When a large crowd appeared, spirited bidding began.

"Rushes Maid," a heifer bred by G. W. Delav of Hot Lake, won the grand championship for females and sold on the block later to S. E. Henpe of Union, for \$450. W. A. Payton of Baker, paid \$400 for "Proud Hope," a yearling. Fifty head were sold, the average for females running almost to \$300, and males slightly less.
