When the United States entered the war the Grizzlies remitted the dues for the period of the war and with the exception of war work, adjourned until peace, in consequence of which there has been nothing doing in club matters for a long time. Sunday, however, a party of 35 members and friends visited the old Connor summer home on the south slope of lower Table Rock, where a meeting was held and fourteen new members were elected and qualified. PARIS, May 5.—The policy of Japan is to return the Shantung peninsula in full sovereignty to China retaining only the economic privileges granted Germany and the right to establish a settlement under the usual conditions at Tsing Tao, it was declared in a statement issued today by Baron Makino, head of the Japanese delegation at the peace conference in explanation of Japan's position on the Shantung question. ITALIANS OFF FOR FRANCE

(Continued from page one.) to return and to allow time for the adjustment of remaining questions concerning Belgium. First Meeting Monday. The executive committee which will launch the League of Nations will hold its first meeting tomorrow. President Wilson or Colonel E. M. House will represent the United States; Lord Robert Cecil will appear for England; Stephen Pichon for France; Premier Venzelos for Greece; the Spanish ambassador for Spain, and Dr. Epitacio Pessoa for Brazil. Italy will probably be represented. The organization of the league will be perfected, many committees appointed and plans probably will be drafted for the initial meeting of the league at Washington next October. The determination of the conference to begin the negotiation of a peace treaty with Austria immediately following the delivery of the treaty to the Germans has been made known to Italy. It is expected the Austrians will arrive toward the middle of May.
