of the German zollverein from January first, last, renounces all right of exploitation of the railroads, adheres to the abrogation of its neutrality and accepts in advance any international agreement as to it, reached by the allied and associated powers.

BOUNDARIES OF GERMANY

"Boundaries of Germany: Germany cedes to France, Alsace-Lorraine, five thousand six hundred square miles, and to Belgium two small districts between Luxembourg and Holland, totalling nine hundred and eighty-nine square miles. She also cedes to Poland the southeastern tip of Silesia beyond and including Oppeln, most of Posen and West Prussia, twenty-seven thousand, six hundred and eighty-six square miles, East Prussia being isolated by a part of Poland. She loses sovereignty over the northeastern most tip of East Prussia, forty square miles north of the River Me-

mel, and the internationalized areas about Danzig, seven hundred and twenty-nine square miles, and the basin of the Saar, seven hundred and thirty-eight square miles, between the western border of the Rhineland Palatinate of Bavaria and the southeast corner of Luxembourg. The Danzig area consists of the V between the Nogat and Vistula rivers made a W by the addition of a similar V on the west including the city of Danzig. The southeastern third of East Prussia and the area between East Prussia and the Vistula, north of latitude 53 degrees, 3 minutes to have its nationality determined by popular vote; five thousand seven hundred and eighty-five square miles, as is to be the case in part of Schleswig, two thousand seven hundred and eighty-seven square miles.

Czechoslovakia

"German-Austria: Germany recognizes the total independence of German-Austria in the boundaries trialed.

"Czechoslovakia: Germany recognizes the entire independence of the Czechoslovak state, including the autonomous territory of the Ruthenians south of the Carpathians and

accepts the frontiers of this state as to be fixed, which in the case of the German frontier shall follow the frontier of Bohemia in 1914.

Poland

Poland: Germany cedes to Poland the greater part of Upper Silesia, Posen and the province of West Prussia on the left bank of the Vistula. A field boundary commission of 75 representing the allied and associated powers and one each representing Poland and Germany—shall be constituted within 15 days of the peace to delimit this boundary.

"East Prussia: The southern and the eastern frontier of East Prussia is to be fixed by plebiscites, the first in the regency of Allenstein between the southern frontier of East Prussia and the northern frontier of Regensburg-Besiek. In each case German troops and authorities will move out within 15 days of the peace and the territories to be placed under an international commission of five members appointed by the five allied and associated powers, with the particular duty of arranging for a free, fair and secret vote. The commission will report the result of the plebiscites to the five powers with a recommenda-

tion for the boundary and will terminate its work as soon as the boundary has been laid down and the new authorities set up.
