

MEDFORD OVER THE TOP WITH \$266,000 GETS HONOR FLAG

Medford went over the top in the Victory Loan drive this morning with a total of \$266,000, three thousand above its quota. This places Jackson county approximately \$20,000 above the quota or a total of \$550,000.

There has been no solicitation for some time but the demand for the bonds continues at a surprising rate. Will Steel, city chairman said today he believed Medford would go \$25,000 over before the end of the campaign.

Jackson county today subscribed \$9000, the same amount as in the former drive, the amount being distributed among the various county districts.

Yesterday Medford received a community honor flag from John L. Etheridge, state director, with a letter of commendation for the splendid spirit of loyalty and cooperation shown. The flag is on exhibition at the Commercial club.

The Victory loan bonds have already been received by the First National bank and are being distributed to those who have made their payments in full.
