

Women in Work

The local Red Cross in very grateful to the Colony club for the \$34.50 donated last week; also to the city for \$65.00. This latter was in cash collected during the epidemic of flu last winter.

Bear in mind the fact there are 350 refugee garments to be made before Red Cross rooms can close for the summer, and if every woman who formerly worked at the Red Cross rooms would give an hour or two each work day these garments could be finished by June 1st.

Mrs. Moers is very anxious to complete the work now on hand before warm weather sets in and if everyone will lend a hand this can be done. Are you a quitter or will you stick to the ship?

The National Red Cross bulletin issued at Washington, D. C., has this to say in regard to Red Cross activities: "Work may be temporarily suspended but not abandoned. Preparedness is essential."

In the northwestern division bulletin we are advised to keep workers in reserve in case of need next fall and winter, in case of emergency.

The American Red Cross has arranged for immediate shipment to its Liberian commission 389,096 yards of bathing and 29,740 blankets, the whole valued at \$520,810.

Four hundred pairs of socks have been knitted for the Red Cross by the women of four New York companies. It's too late for Medford women to learn to knit, but as a unit they might take some of the refugee garments over to the city hall and make for the local chapter since women in Medford who sew are scarce.

Men who were discharged from service prior to the passage of the law providing for the 5c per mile transportation should be advised that the war department has not yet formulated a plan for paying this travel money, and that until a plan is officially announced no claims should be sent in. As soon as these plans are completed the home service sections will be notified.
