

7 MILLION RAINBOW TROUT EGGS WILL BE DISTRIBUTED

EUGENE, Ore., May 12.—Seven million rainbow trout eggs will be taken from Spencer creek, Diamond lake and Four Mile lake this summer, according to State Game Warden Carl Shoemaker, who conferred today with Eugene sportsmen over game projects. All these waters are in Klamath county. The McKenzie hatchery in Lane county will receive a large portion of this number, according to Warden Shoemaker. The Klamath hatchery is able to handle about 500,000 eggs, he says. Four million eggs have already been taken at the Spencer creek station and the collectors are now establishing their equipment at Diamond lake. The spawn is carried over six miles of snow drifts and banks. The United States bureau of fishing has promised the state one million rainbow eggs, 500,000 black spotted and as many eastern brook trout eggs as are desired by the Oregon fish and game commission, according to Mr. Shoemaker.
