ENLISTING MEN FOR ARMY IN MEDFORD

The United States army has again established a recruiting office in the federal building, after a lapse of a year, with Sergeant Joseph White of Portland, in charge and has extensively billed the city and county with announcements that the army wants to enlist 50,000 men at once for service in France, as well as men for service in Russia, the Philippines and other foreign ports.

A young man can now enlist for one or three years, with no reserve clause. Men who have had previous service in the army, navy or marine corps can be accepted for one year and will not have to wait at training camps but will be sent at once to France. Men without previous experience may be accepted for a three years enlistment period with the proviso that at the end of the first year if for any reason they are dissatisfied with the service they can apply for discharge.

YANKS STAR IN PARIS BASEBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

PARIS, May 12.—(Monday). Famous athletes who served with the American expeditionary forces, but who have returned to the United States, may enter the inter-allied games to be held next month. An effort to finance thru relief organizations their transportation to France is being made by General Peyton C. March, chief of staff.

The American crews entered for the regatta at Henley, England, on July 4 and 5 are in training. There will be no grand challenge cup this year but the Henley stewards have substituted a service race with crews from Canada, the British flying corps, Australia, New Zealand and America represented.

The climax of the season's service rowing will be the inter-allied regatta, which will be held two weeks after the events at Henley. The crews from France, Belgium and Czechoslovakia, in addition to the Americans have been entered.

At the opening of the French university baseball league here yesterday, the University of Paris defeated the University of Lyons by a score of 4 to 3. The teams were composed of members of the American army who are studying in France. The stars for Paris were Wilmet Whitney, pitcher, formerly of Harvard; Hugh Kelliker, catcher, formerly of Princeton, and George Abbot, second baseman, captain of the Harvard team in 1917.

The American expeditionary University of Beausse won the inter-university track meet in that city yesterday over teams from the Universities of Toulouse, Montpellier, Dijon, Grenoble, Poitiers and Nancy.

SEND AUSTRIA FOOD EXCHANGE FOR GOODS

VIENNA, Monday, May 12.—(By Associated Press.) An American mission has been sent to the Ukraine by Captain Thomas Gregory of the inter-allied food commission to arrange for an exchange of Austrian manufactured goods for flour and potatoes for use here. This would give the Austrians a chance to secure food in Europe instead of depending upon American importations and they would be able to pay in cash for their
