

IRISH APPEAL FOR FREEDOM GIVEN TO PRESIDENT

PARIS, April 20.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—A special appeal in behalf of Ireland was made to President Wilson by Sean P. O'Connell, the Sinn Fein representative of the provisional government of the Irish republic, when the Irish delegate laid the French memorial before the peace conference. The appeal was contained in a letter to President Wilson asking him to urge the peace conference to invite the Irish national representatives to be present at its deliberations. Mr. O'Connell also urged President Wilson to support the claim to freedom which the Irish representatives wish to lay before the conference.

Referring to the memorial in which he had recited the claims of the "Irish republic" to the right to join the League of Nations as an independent state, Mr. O'Connell wrote to the president: "To what has been said in that memorial, urging the justice of letting Ireland's claim to freedom be heard before a political status hateful to her is stamped with the approval and enforced by the power of the free nations of the world, may I not add that the people of Ireland look hopefully to you in a special degree for countenance and support notably because you are the honored president of that republic which counts among its most loyal and devoted citizens the greater part of the Irish race and because they recognize in you the clearest exponent of the principles of freedom of the world has seen since the days of Washington.

"In their latest careers, last December, of the inherent right of self determination the Irish people, at this world crisis, have been profoundly influenced and inspired by the words you have spoken, the principles you have expounded, the rules of international conduct you have promulgated and have brought the nations to acknowledge. In these utterances they have found a source of great encouragement and highest hope. In particular they affirm, as anxious especially to the case of Ireland, the following passage in your speech of September 27, 1918, in New York:—

"The issues are, these: Shall the military power of any nation or group of nations be suffered to determine the fortunes of peoples over whom they have no right to rule except by right of force? Shall strong nations be free to wrong weak nations and make them subject to their purposes and interests? Shall peoples be ruled and dominated even in their own internal affairs by arbitrary and irresponsible force or by their own will and choice? Shall there be a common standard of right and privilege for all peoples and nations, or shall there be a common concert to oblige the observance of common rights?"

"In the clear light of these great words the Irish people, filled with hope, ask your mighty influence to prevent the execution of Ireland from the principles of freedom and justice to which you are rallying the support of the world, to urge upon the conference the duty of inviting the Irish national representatives to be present at its deliberations, and support the claim to freedom which they are waiting to place before the tribunal of the nations."

BOLSHEVIKI KILL WHEN THEY FAIL TO MAKE MONEY

PARIS, April 19.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Bolshevism, in the untutored mind of the Russian proletariat, is a system under which everybody has plenty of money and one needs to work only two or three hours a day, writes a special correspondent of L'Intransigent from Russia. The money they needed, the monks were told, they would find in the factories, and all they would have to do would be to go and get it. Disappointment awaited them in most cases, for the great majority of the manufacturers were ruined, and the office cash boxes were generally empty. The next course was to seize the proprietor by the throat. "Where is our money?" they would demand. "The money that we've earned by our sweat and blood?"

"One plant owner answered that he had no money, and offered to prove by his books that he had not even enough to keep body and soul together. The men fumbled through the books; but being ignorant of the rule of three, they could not understand the entries. Then somebody found an entry of two million rubles under the heading 'mortgages.' The Russian for which is 'Amortizatsia.' "What is this?" they demanded furiously. "Amortizatsia must be the name of a woman. She has gotten our money. Who is she? Where is she?"

Others whose campaigns were being waged were John Willis Beer, a Los Angeles banker, and Dr. S. Hall Young, an Alaskan missionary.

CAPTAIN'S WIFE AND 4 CHILDREN DROWN

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., May 15.—Six persons, including the captain's wife and four children, and the co-captain were drowned when the coal barge Nanticoke, owned by the Potter Transportation company of New York, sank off the Isles of Shoals early today. Captain William Gray and Allen McDougall, a deck-hand, were picked up by the coast guard at Rye Beach after they had drifted about in a small boat for several hours. They are the only survivors.
