

ENGLAND PAYS FITTING TRIBUTE EDITH CAVELL

Body Taken From Brussels to Native City of Norwich—Impressive ceremonies at Westminster Abbey Attended By Royalty—London Streets Packed With Mourners.

LONDON, May 15.—(By Associated Press.) England paid tribute to Edith Cavell, the English nurse executed by the Germans at Brussels October 12, 1915, today when her body, enroute from Brussels to her native city of Norwich, was taken to Westminster Abbey for an impressive memorial service.

It was a public funeral, in which it seemed every resident of the great metropolis endeavored to participate. The streets through which the cortege moved were congested with crowds and every inch of standing room in the neighborhood of the abbey was occupied by a densely massed multitude which was eager to pay homage to "that brave woman" as the bishop of London described her, "who deserves a great deal from the British empire."

The congregation at the abbey included high officials of the government, representatives of foreign countries and men prominent in many walks of life. King George was represented by the Earl of Athlone, brother of Queen Mary.

The service was conducted by the dean of Westminster. No address was delivered. The opening sentences of the burial service were sung by the choir, which then sang the 23rd Psalm and a short lesson from the Revelations of St. John. Then came Sullivan's anthem "Yea, Though I Walk Through the Valley of the Shadow of Death," and "I Heard a Voice from Heaven."

The Lord's prayer and two collects were then repeated, followed by the hymn "Abide With Me." The benediction was then pronounced and the last post and reveille were sounded. The service which began at noon lasted half an hour. The procession left the abbey to the strains of Chopin's funeral march and proceeded to the station where the coffin of plain oak was placed on a train for Norwich.

On the coffin was the simple inscription: "Edith Cavell. Born December 4, 1865. Died October 12, 1915."

At Norwich it was placed on a gun carriage and was taken to Norwich Cathedral. The service which was officially designated "for the funeral of Edith Cavell, a nurse who gave her life for her countrymen" followed.

RAYMOND FOSDICK AMERICAN MEMBER LEAGUE OF NATIONS

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Raymond B. Fosdick, a New York lawyer, who was chairman of the commission on training camp activities during the war, will be one of the permanent American officials in the League of Nations when the league is organized. The exact position to which Mr. Fosdick will be appointed was not known today in Washington.

Mr. Fosdick is 36 years old. His home formerly was in Buffalo, N. Y. He first came into public notice ten years ago when soon after being graduated from Princeton and taking a post graduate course at the New York law school he began practicing law in New York and became connected with Mayor Gavnor's administration. As commissioner of accounts the investigations he conducted into municipal affairs attracted country wide attention.

During 1913 Mr. Fosdick worked in Europe investigating police systems for the Rockefeller bureau of social hygiene. When the United States entered the war he took the chairmanship of the commission on training camp activities, serving without pay. The work was broadened into the business of providing wholesome recreations and relaxation for the troops in the field and in pursuing it Mr. Fosdick has spent a great deal of time in Europe during the last two years. President Wilson, it is known to Mr. Fosdick's friends, regards his qualities highly. At present Mr. Fosdick is in the west but is expected in Washington early next week.

SCANDAL CASES ARE AIRED IN JUSTICE COURT

There was scandal galore aired in Justice Taylor's court today in two separate cases, one involving a violation of the Mann act, another taking in a white slavery charge and still another of just plain moral violation. The technical charges in each case was varnished, but in the first two cases more serious charges may be made after the grand jury meets next Monday.

Early this morning Sheriff Terrill, Night Policeman Brownlee and Mrs. S. H. Unton of Portland, who is a state officer and field officer of the Pacific Coast Rescue and Protective society, arrested in a room in a local hotel an 18 year old woman from Albany, Ore., and M. Whitejob, a well known traveling salesman of San Francisco, and in another room in the same hotel arrested David Davidson of Albany.

It is charged that the woman in the case and Davidson have been traveling together for several weeks and last week stowed several days at another Medford hotel registering as man and wife. Then they drifted to Klamath Falls where at a dance Whitejob met the woman. They came together from Weed, Cal., to Medford arriving last evening, and Whitejob paying her railroad fare. Davidson was on the same train. The three then went separately to the hotel and each obtained separate rooms. The woman registered under the name of Gloria Monroe of Raymond, Wash. Both she and Whitejob admit having made an agreement in Weed to meet last night. Davidson is a bridge engineer who served during the war in the spruce division of the army.

The arrests were due to the efforts made by Mrs. Unton who had been working on a case in Klamath Falls and was en route from there to Portland when her attention was attracted to Whitejob and the woman on the train. When the train reached Ashland late yesterday afternoon she got off and boarded a jitney and made a hurried trip to Medford so as to get here ahead of the train and make arrangements for keeping the couple under surveillance and if necessary causing their arrest. She enlisted the services of the authorities.

In court today Whitejob, Davidson and the woman all pleaded guilty to the technical charge of vagrancy, and Justice Taylor after hearing the evidence reserved pronouncing of sentence until next Tuesday by which time the grand jury is expected to have threshed out the serious aspects of the case. Each is held in \$250 bail until Tuesday. Whitejob, who is well known to a number of local merchants, put up cash bail, and Davidson and his erstwhile partner were taken to the jail at Jacksonville, both being unable to furnish bond.

It appears that while Mrs. Unton and the local authorities were investigating into the above case last night and early today they ran into another case of vagrancy, finding Mrs. Gherkin of Ashland, whose husband is either dead or divorced, mother of three children, and Joe Beardsley, of Ashland, employed at the Dodge ranch near Eagle Point, together in a Main street rooming house. They were arrested on a vagrancy charge to which they pleaded guilty and each was fined \$25 and costs. The penalty would have been heavier had the couple not announced their intention to get married at once.

PRAYER MEETING FOR CENTENARY TONIGHT

This evening the regular mid-week service will be held at the headquarters, only they will be different. Recognizing that the real test of devotion is before the members and friends of the church, and that without the leadership of the living Christ the test cannot be met, many are impressed to remember the fellowship of prayer into which they have entered.

EMPERATOR SAILS FIRST TIME UNDER U. S. FLAG
BREST, France, May 15.—The liner Emperor, which was turned over to the United States by Germany under the armistice agreement, sailed today for America. On board were 1,100 first class passengers, 2,200 second class, including the 354th infantry, the 17th infantry brigade headquarters, aviation ambulance company No. 11, and 810 women nurses, Y. M. C. A. workers and soldiers' brides. This is the first overseas journey for the Emperor under the American flag.

ELKS PURCHASE 12 ACRE TRACT FOR FISH CLUB

The Medford Elks lodge has purchased a tract of 12 acres fronting on Rogue river and will there establish a summer resort and camp grounds for the use of the local Elks and their families only. The matter of establishing such a resort has been under consideration by the lodge for years but only came to a head recently. The possession of this beautifully located tract, which will eventually be greatly improved, gives the Elks of Medford something which no other Elks lodge in the state has, a private picnic, outing and camping resort.

The location is an ideal one, one of the prettiest places along the entire length of the river, and only twenty-five minutes auto ride from the city. The twelve acres just purchased was a part of the George Givens ranch and has a half mile frontage on the river. It is reached by the Crater Lake highway and is located three miles up the river from the Acate railroad crossing. Beautiful shade trees and a comparatively level sandy beach are among its advantages.

It will be next summer before the elaborate improvements on the grounds will be ready, but the Elks park will be put into use in a month. Camp and picnic grounds will be established at once, a baseball diamond laid out, dance floor built, electric lights installed and a water system established. The construction of a suitable club house and pavilion and other permanent buildings are being talked of to be ready for use by next spring. The Elks park will have a private entrance and the entire park will be closed to the general public.

A number of Elks are already planning to camp in the park this summer as its accessibility from the city makes it practicable for a business man to go there at the end of the day and come back in time for business next morning.

American navy seaplane NC-4 after leaving Halifax this morning for Trepassey, N. F., descended at Musquodoboit harbor owing to engine trouble, but resumed her flight at 11:47 a. m. (New York time.)

WASHINGTON, May 15.—Although the NC-4 should reach Trepassey Bay between 3 and 4 o'clock this afternoon, the trans-Atlantic flight may be started late today without this vessel in Commander John H. Towers' squadron. Naval officials said that with good weather forecast over the long course to the Azores, Commander Towers very probably would not further delay the start of the NC-1 and NC-3 to wait for the NC-4.

It has been expected that the planes would leave Trepassey just before sunset so that the fliers might have the benefit of the full moon on as much of the long voyage to Ponta Delgada as possible.

The commander stated that if the NC-4 left Trepassey 12 hours later than her sister planes she will be able to make the flight to Lisbon in their company. The trans-Atlantic voyage could not be delayed much longer, he said, because the destroyers in the warship patrol were exhausting their fuel.
