Fighting the Eating Insects

The eating or chewing class of insects must be fed poison to kill them, says today's bulletin from the National War Garden Commission of Washington.

Arsenate of lead, one of the best poisons, comes in two forms, powder and paste. The powder is easiest to weigh out and handle and keeps indefinitely. Use one ounce of powder or two ounces of paste in six quarts of water or Bordeaux mixture.

Outworm Ahoy!

Head off that outworm, Mr. Gardener, or it will cut off some of your corn, cabbage or tomato plants, says today's bulletin from the National War Garden Commission of Washington.

Outworms have a sweet tooth and will eat sweetened poisoned bait. Mix together one pound of bran and one-half ounce of powdered white arsenic. Stir a little water and two or three tablespoonfuls of cheap molasses and mix in with the bran and arsenic.
