

BRYAN ASKS THE CHURCH TO AID BY MONEY LOANS

ST. LOUIS, Mo., May 16.—Recommendations to grant women sex equality in church affairs, endorsement of the inter-church world movement, and comprehensive plans for a five year church expansion program were laid before commissioners of the Presbyterian church in the United States here today at the second day's session of the 131st Presbyterian general assembly.

A larger place in church leadership for women was recommended in the new expansion program which provided that women be given the right to hold offices in the church council, the board of trustees and all committees of the church.

Full co-operation with the inter-church world movement and support of all worthy federated movements to promote the co-operation of all Protestant churches in solving social, religious and civic problems also was recommended.

William Jennings Bryan attended the sessions today. Mr. Bryan is urging that the assembly take some action to establish a financial aid bureau to be supported by the church for lending money to needy members to save them from resorting to chattel mortgage money lenders.

Establishment in every community of men's clubs as substitutes for the saloons minus their demoralizing influence also was advocated by Mr. Bryan.

MAYOR OLE HANSON TO SPEAK N. Y. BANQUET

NEW YORK, May 16.—Mayor Ole Hanson of Seattle will be the chief speaker at the banquet in connection with the annual session of the National Association of Manufacturers here May 19-20-21. Responses from members indicate that the registration will be double that at any meeting in recent years.

Committees of the association will report on questions of employment, banking, foreign trade, interstate commerce, taxation, Bolshevism, social unrest, government ownership of railroads, employers' duties to returning soldiers and other business topics. The plan of the association for formation of trade combinations under the Webb-Pomerene act will be discussed May 20.

DELEGATES NAMED LABOR CONFERENCE

PARIS, May 16.—Announcement was made today that the following delegates to the international labor conference to be held in Washington, D. C., next October have appointed Professor J. T. Shotwell, who represented the United States on the commission for organizing the conference, United States; Sir Malcolm Delevingne, assistant under secretary of state in the British home office, Great Britain; Palma Castiglione, one of the secretaries of the peace commission on international labor legislation, Italy; Professor William Rappard, professor of political economy at Geneva University, Switzerland; and Minero Oka, chief of bureau at the Japanese ministry of commerce, Japan.

16,000 R. R. WORKERS GET WAR MEDALS

COLUMBUS, Ohio, May 16.—Sixteen thousand members of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen will be awarded special war medals for the part they took in the war by the organization, it is announced by officers of the brotherhood in Triennial convention here today. The organization's service flag contains more than 840 gold stars.

The organization has gained 5,248 members in three years, and in that time has conducted 12 "successful" strikes. It went on record as pleased with the Adamson law as a war time measure.

Montana on Mountain Time.

WASHINGTON, May 16.—The whole state of Montana was put in standard mountain time at the request of commercial interests, according to an announcement by the interstate commerce commission today.

UKRAINE AND POLAND KEY TO RUSSIA POWER

VIENNA, April 2.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—That Poland and the Ukraine are the keys

to Russia is the conviction of The Associated Press correspondent who has just traveled over those two countries and interviewed dozens of the highest officers, officials and citizens. There has been more talk than action concerning Poland as a barrier to Bolshevism, but there has been not only no talk but some unfavorable action regarding the Ukraine, which country is almost unknown to a majority of the people in the entire countries. The Ukraine has been visited in a casual manner by strollers, officers and missions. A single American officer who attempted to

visit Kiev, capital of the Russian Ukraine, was prevented by the French at Odessa, according to the statement made to the Associated Press by General Petulra at his railway car camp on a siding at Praskorov. There is plenty of food in the Ukraine, but Bolshevism obtained the upper hand there owing to use of money from Moscow, agitation and the having of troops which otherwise could have been faithful. What is now important is that it should be understood that there really is a national movement in the Ukraine, and that this movement with a little heralded recognition and moral support

would manfully continue the struggle against the Moscow invaders and aid in preventing the invasion of Rumania, thus closing the Bolshevik corridor to Budapest.

Women Criticize League Pact.

ZURICH, May 14.—The Women's International Conference for Permanent Peace in session here discussed the League of Nations today. Many criticisms and amendments were suggested and these will be communicated to the peace conference in Paris.
