

PRESIDENT IS PLEASED WITH R. R. MESSAGE

Wilson Sends Thanks to Railroad Trainmen for Expression of Loyalty—Brotherhood Goes On Record Against I. W. W.'ism and the Bolshevik Agitation.

WASHINGTON, May 16.—President Wilson has cabled William G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, expressing appreciation of a message of loyalty sent him by Mr. Lee on behalf of the brotherhood, which is holding its annual convention at Columbus, Ohio. The president's cablegram, received at the White House today, says: "Please express to the trainmen assembled in convention my warm appreciation of the message you have just sent me. It has done my heart good and made me feel the fine spirit of such friends in a way to make the work here easier for me. My warmest best wishes for the success of the convention."

COLUMBUS, Ohio, May 16.—That the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen has "no part or sympathy in any of the plans that pretend the hope of the world is only to be found in its destruction," that the organization is "one hundred per cent American," and that it "does not subscribe to any theory that proposes to throw everybody into one common slough of despondency for the purpose of experimenting in the hope that out of this general mental and physical misery an average may come that will bring about a general better condition of affairs for a majority of the people," is the railroad man's attitude toward government as expressed by W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, in his address before the convention here late today. The address was in response to welcome addresses made by Governor James M. Cox and Mayor Karb. "We stand for no such doctrine as destruction and ruin; we believe in the government of our representatives and stand as one hundred per cent Americans ready to defend our principles and our faith," he declared. "In referring to the brotherhood, Mr. Lee at all times included the membership in Canada as well as in the United States. "There are labor organizations," Mr. Lee continued, "that seek refuge under the banner of labor unionism that properly have no right to claim affiliation with labor organization, and in proof of this their readiness to raise the red flag of anarchy and declare for revolution at every opportunity. I want to assure you that the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen has neither part nor purpose in any scheme that proposes to destroy this government or take from any citizen either privilege or property that properly belongs to him."

PREPARE TOURIST CAMPING GROUND ON BEAR CREEK

Workmen are busy getting ready the new free auto camp ground for tourists passing thru the city that is being established by the Jackson County Business Men's association in the rear and at the north side of the Natatorium. The establishment of this resort will, it is estimated, result in motor tourists spending at least \$1000 a month with Medford merchants this summer and fall. Heretofore thru lack of suitable camping accommodations the tourists have passed by the city in both directions to go to the Ashland park camp

ground or similar places north of the city. The new grounds will be ready for tourists by the first of next week. The grounds surrounding the Natatorium have been thoroughly cleaned up, the grass has been cut, the old hitching racks torn out and lunch tables and benches are being placed. Gas cooking plates, a water system and a telephone booth are among the other improvements, while the camp ground has been fenced off from the rear yards of the South Riverside homes. The toilet arrangements of the Natatorium have been obtained for use in connection with the camp ground. Altogether the commodious camp ground with its plentiful shade, close proximity to the stores and location along Bear creek will prove a very inviting place for the tourists and represents a long felt want in the city. For a week past motor tourists passing thru the city have used the location for a stopping place despite its hitherto somewhat uninviting appearance. A large tourist patronage is predicted thruout the season.

DANIELS LEADER ELKS SALVATION ARMY CAMPAIGN

The Salvation Army drive for \$250,000 for its home service campaign in the state of Oregon, which will be handled by the Elks of the state will begin on June 22nd and end on June 30th. Jackson county's apportionment of this sum is \$7000, and the Medford Elks will manage the campaign for this city and the county north of Phoenix, the Ashland Elks for all the county south of Phoenix. The Medford Elks will also handle the Josephine county campaign thru the many members of the local lodge residing in that county. Josephine county's quota is \$2500. T. E. Daniels will be the campaign manager for the Elks in both counties.

The Salvation Army with its customary business thoroughness has issued the following statement to the people of Oregon of how the \$250,000 will be spent: Portland Rescue and Maternity Home, 323 East 15th street, North, for operating and maintenance of the home, \$7,000. Portland Men's Social Institution,

24 Union avenue, for operating and replacement of equipment, \$1500. For operating expenses and enlarging operations, Salvation Army work in Oregon, \$3000. For Scandinavian administration and extensions, \$1000. Operating and enlargement of young people's work, state of Oregon, \$1500. Executive oversight and training of Salvation Army officers; also disabled officers fund, \$3500. Prison work for the state of Oregon, in state prison and with prisoners, \$2000. For relief of poor families in the city of Portland, \$7500. Central Salvation Army building, Portland, containing facilities for senior, junior work, relief, missing friends, free employment and dispensary, and rooms for men, \$150,000. New buildings for Salvation Army corps in Oregon, including auditoriums, public rest rooms, club rooms for soldiers, etc., \$55,000. Deficit of corps budgets in the state of Oregon, \$18,000.
