**BOYS BICYCLE RACES PLANNED MEMORIAL DAY**

Rogue river valley amateur bicycle race to be held at Medford, Ore., on Decoration day, May 30, 1919, beginning 2 p. m. Events:

1 mile—Open to boys under 13 years.

1 mile—Open to boys under 15 years.

1 mile—Open to all comers.

Prizes: The full list of prizes to be announced later. Eastern manufacturers are interested and will contribute prizes. In addition prizes are assured from Piper & Taft of Seattle, Pacific Motor Supply company of San Francisco; Hagley-Davidson Motor company, Mayor C. E. Gates and W. R. Gaylord.

Entries: All entries must be made in writing on blanks to be furnished; must be filed with W. R. Gaylord, Medford, Ore., on or before May 29th at 6 o'clock p. m. All minors must have the written permission of their parents or guardian. All entrants must be residents of Jackson, Josephine or Curry county and must be amateurs.

The co-operation of the city officials of Medford is assured, and Chief of Police George O. Timothy will act as the official starter for the races. The races will start on the Pacific highway and will be run so as to finish at the Nantatorium.

The federal authorities are taking an active interest in the hotel scandal case of last Wednesday night which resulted in the arrest of M. Whitjob, San Francisco travelling salesman, David Davidson, Albany bridge engineer, and "Gloria Monroe" of Albany on charges of vagrancy. United States District Attorney Heney telegraphed from Portland yesterday to Sheriff Terrill to at once arrest Whitjob who was out on bail pending sentence being pronounced in Justice Taylor's court Monday, and hold him in the county jail. Mr. Heney or one of his assistants, and a deputy U. S. marshal were expected to arrive in the city this afternoon. A Mann act violation charge is expected against Whitjob, and a white slavery charge against Davidson.
