SAVE THE 1919 FRUIT CROP.

JACKSON COUNTY has in prospect the largest fruit crop in its history. But prospects don't pay bills. To make this prospect a reality, the fruit crop must be sprayed, thinned, sized, and packed. To do this the fruit growers must have labor.

The labor shortage in the valley is already acute. With a large highway construction program this shortage will increase rather than diminish. What is true in Jackson county, is true in every district of the state. If Jackson county is to harvest its fruit crop it can not depend upon outside aid; the crop must be harvested by the people of Jackson county!

Here is a problem that is the immediate concern of every business house in the county and every man, woman and child. The 1919 fruit crop at a conservative estimate will be worth a million and a half dollars, in the market. But it won't be worth a lead nickel on the trees. Getting the crop to the market is important to the fruit grower but it is no less important to the community, for every individual in the community will benefit from the prosperity which its marketing will bring.

The time has now come to prepare for the harvest and for the preliminaries necessary to get the harvest. Every able bodied man, woman and child in the county, without steady employment, should volunteer for this work. If necessary holidays should be proclaimed so that the business men themselves can assist in the work. This crop must be brought to fruition and must be sold. Waiting for something to turn up won't do it. Waiting for higher pay won't do it. Any individual able to work who refuses to work this year, should be made to work or move on.

With a record breaking crop on the trees, there is no more place for the loafer now than there was for the slacker a year ago. Good wages will be paid. What the individual gets in hire will be augmented—what he will get as a member of a community in which over a million dollars will be distributed.

Lets get busy on this job now. We have been praying for prosperity these many years. Now we have prosperity if we only work for it. Who will be the first to hand in his name on the workers' list?

WASHINGTON, May 19.—Formal notice of a contest in the election of Truman H. Newberry, republican senator-elect from Michigan, was given today with the filing in the senate of petitions by Henry Ford, defeated democratic candidate, asking for an investigation of campaign expenditures and a recount of the ballots. The charges are a repetition of those presented by Mr. Ford last session to the senate elections committee.

Mr. Newberry, however, took his seat without opposition.

NC-3 CRUISING TO PONTA

(Continued from page one.)

seas this forenoon for the NC-3 which was last heard from 162 miles northwest of Corvo at 9:14 a. m. on Saturday. Unless the crew has been picked up by a passing craft or their plane landed near one of the adjacent islands and is unable to communicate the safety of Commander Towers and his men is feared for by naval men here because of the heavy seas and gales of the last 48 hours. All available warcraft have been ordered to join the search.

The NC-4 which arrived at Horta in perfect condition Saturday expects to start for Ponta Delgada this forenoon, but as she has fuel enough on board for a flight to Lisbon, she may fly directly for that port.

The NC-1, which is being towed here badly damaged, will be dismantled and shipped to the United States on the cruiser Columbia. The crew of the NC-1 are all safe on the Columbia.

WASHINGTON, May 19.—Altho it was said it was possible London might get the news first, the navy department early today had not been informed as to the unofficially reported rescue of the crew of the seaplane NC-3 as told in a news dispatch from London this morning. It was stated, however, that interrupted cable service between the Azores and the United States might account for a report of the rescue reaching American naval officers in London before it was received here.

No news from the NC-2, missing since early Saturday morning when Commander J. H. Towers reported the plane then was off her course about 200 miles from her destination had been received at the navy department. As more than 50 hours had passed since this message was picked up and owing to bad weather and sea conditions that would have made it very difficult for the craft to live on the ocean's surface, uneasiness of naval officers for the safety of the crew has increased overnight.

More than a score naval vessels which have been sweeping the sea since a short time after the NC-3 became lost, kept up their search thru-out the night and increased efforts to find them were begun today.

In the meantime, the NC-4, which had arrived at Horta safely, was weather-bound, but was expected to resume her flight to Lisbon, Portugal, for the second lap of the flight today.

Daniels Delighted WASHINGTON, May 19.—When Secretary Daniels was informed of the sighting of the NC-3 he personally telephoned Mrs. Towers the good tidings and then dispatched the fol-

lowing message to Commander Towers at the Azores:

"I knew you would make it. Heartiest congratulations on your plucky and successful flight. Just told your wife good news. Congratulate other commanders and crew for so splendidly upholding navy's traditions."

With the NC-3 making Ponta Delgada under her own power, officials expressed belief that the big seaplane could be put into condition to continue the flight to Lisbon and Plymouth.

Bellinger Makes Statement

Horta, May 19.—Lieutenant Commander P. N. L. Bellinger, the commander of the NC-1 gave out a statement today in which he told of his experiences at the close of the flight. In part the statement says:

"We kept to our course until we struck the fog when we lost our bearings. We made a good landing on the sea which was rough and choppy with heavy swells. A strong wind continued until we were picked up. At 6 p. m. (Greenwich time) we sighted the masts of the Ionia above the horizon. We were unable to see the hull and as she did not have wireless we were unable to communicate with her. We, therefore, started taxiing toward her. About this time the Ionia sighted us and lowered a boat which picked us up at 6:20 p. m. We tried to salvage the plane, but the tow lines of the Ionia broke and we were forced to give up the attempt."

"We were rescued with difficulty because the small boat of the Ionia was tossed about like a cork. All of us were seasick, otherwise we did not suffer."

"We sent out S. O. S. calls after landing, but the radio sending radius was only 50 miles on the surface of the water. While awaiting rescue we intercepted messages between destroyers. We last heard the radio of the NC-3 at 9:15 o'clock Saturday morning."

CENTENARY DRIVE IN MEDFORD NETS \$9000 ONE DAY

The Centenary drive of the First Methodist church which began yesterday resulted in securing cash and subscriptions to the amount of a little over \$9,000. Large congregations were present at both services. After the morning service at which all the team workers, and the people as well, received final instructions, the drive began and lasted until the time for the evening service, when reports were made. Of the twelve captains nine reported and when the aggregate was announced by Dr. Carlos the people sang heartily "Praise God From Whom All Blessings Flow." One of the pleasing features was the generous offering in cash and subscriptions from the Japanese members and friends. Another was the fact that several who are not members of the church made substantial subscriptions.

The drive will continue all the week and every member and friend will be given the opportunity to contribute to this worthy movement, which as Bishop Hughes has said, "is not an anti-climax of the world war, but its complement and fulfillment."

The final reports will be made next Sunday, and by that time it is confidently expected that the local church will go "over the top." This means that additional subscriptions to the amount of over \$4,000 will be needed.

The first day's drive for the centenary fund in the Central Point church resulted in the subscription of \$1,250.
