first time since 1911, had majorities in both branches of congress. In the house they have a margin of 39 votes, but in the senate their majority is only five.

The senate assembling today had

49 republicans and 7 democrats. The new house roll lists 238 republicans, 189 democrats, 2 independents, 1 prohibitionist, 1 socialist and 4 vacancies (all in democratic districts.)—a total of 435. The house division gives the republicans a majority of 46 over the democrats and 39 over all combined opposition.

Republican action promises, however to be restrained by President Wilson's veto power as a two-thirds vote is necessary to override a veto.

Message from Europe Today was the first time that congress had convened with a president in Europe and his opening message cabled from foreign soil. The president's message will not be sent to congress until tomorrow. It probably will not refer to the peace treaty as Mr. Wilson expects to present the treaty personally next month.

Important house committees were to be chosen today, but the senate republicans were not ready with their committee assignments because of

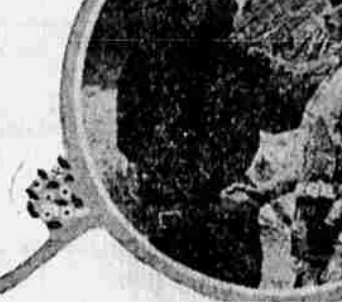
