KLAMATH PLANS IRRIGATION DAM ON LOST RIVER

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 20.

Plans are being worked out for construction of a dam across Lost River bed below Merrill by which later it is proposed to irrigate the reclaimed lands of Tule lake. Project Manager H. D. Newell announced today. Newell said there was no certainty as to when work would be undertaken but that the plans will be ready when the funds are available.

The main canal of the project, while large enough for present needs, will not be sufficient when the Tule lake bed is irrigated, according to Newell and it is planned to use the old bed of Lost River for a portion of the distance to carry the extra supply.
