There was a fair attendance at a profitable meeting of the Jackson County Business Men's association Monday evening in St. Mark's hall. A bounteous supper was served by the ladies of St. Mark's Guild, consisting of Medford and Oregon made products.

In the absence of the president, B. W. Paul, vice president, presided.

A report of Victory Week was made by Clarence Meeker and J. H. Carlin, showing it to be a big success with a balance in the treasury.

Earl Gaddis reported the auto camp grounds in the rear of the Nat. in operation and all are requested to direct tourists to the grounds.

After a general discussion it was decided that the merchants should have a big dollar day or bargain day in June and a committee of five to look after the same and to be known as the status committee was authorized and will be appointed at once.

The use of home products was discussed and on motion the secretary was instructed to notify those who served the banquets to use Vitmo, the home flour, hereafter, instead of Portland made flour and to use Rogon River Canning company products, also home made butter, etc. It was decided to urge everybody to use Medford and Jackson county products first, then Oregon and Pacific coast products.

The question of the location of a fair grounds was discussed and it was the opinion that something be done at once provided suitable grounds could be secured. Mr. Williams, who owns a tract near Phoenix, was presented and made a proposition to sell the same and B. Dodge was also present in the interests of the same tract.

E. A. Welch reported the rate case hearing in which Medford is deeply interested, had been postponed.

Mrs. Humphrey, representing Portland manufacturers and jobbers, made a short talk in the interests of home products.

FREE CONCERT BY GIRLS GLEE CLUB MONDAY NIGHT

All music lovers of the city as well as patrons and friends of the high school in general have a treat in store Wednesday night in the first combined public concert to be given by the Girls Glee club of the high school and the high school orchestra, in the high school auditorium. Admittance will be free and the general public is invited to attend. Give Western Oregon a Square Deal

To the Editor: Will you allow me space in your valuable paper to say a few words in regard to the reconstruction measures to be voted upon in June from a coast county view point?

You are well aware that western Oregon is one of the most productive yet undeveloped sections of the state. The people in the coast counties have never complained, but with true western grit and determination, they have had to contend with adverse circumstances on account of lack of roads and had transportation; consequently, it is not surprising that all the coast counties are united and greatly interested in the proposed Roosevelt military highway, which will be the means of opening up to settlement a large amount of valuable land suitable for dairying, and land that is similar to that of Tillamook county, where the dairymen have made such a great success of cheese making. It may interest you to know that the dairy herds of Tillamook county produced 45,100,156 pounds of milk last year, and this made 5,026,900 pounds of cheese, valued at \$1,252,694. This will be duplicated many times if the Roosevelt highway is built, and the coast counties will produce more cheese than that produced in Wisconsin and some of the other cheese producing states of the east, for the reason that climatic conditions are ideal for cheese making in the coast counties. The dairymen and grazers are all lined up in these counties for the Roosevelt Highway.

What the coast counties want is an opportunity to develop western Oregon. They now appeal to the generous and magnanimous spirit of the people of Oregon to help them do so, as western Oregon has received but slight recognition by way of improvements, but have always cheerfully paid their taxes, some of which have gone to help develop other parts of the state. All that western Oregon wants is a square deal, and I am sure if the people of the state knew of the undeveloped resources that are in the coast counties, they would readily cast their votes in favor of the Roosevelt highway measure. It will be a market road, but at the same time it will be used for pleasure by more people living in Portland, southern Oregon, eastern Oregon and the Willamette valley than by people living in the coast counties, and it will outclass the Columbia Highway for scenic beauty and picturesqueness, as
