

SUMMER WATER REGULATIONS ARE PUT INTO FORCE

Due to the hot weather of the past two days City Water Superintendent Arnsperger because the increased consumption of water in irrigating lawns and gardens lowered the reservoir considerably and consequently decreased the fire pressure, last night decided after consulting with Mayor Gates and the city council to put the annual summer water regulations into effect Thursday, which is much earlier than had been intended. These regulations which are the same as last year, with irrigation hours between 4 a. m. and 11 p. m., are as follows:

"Monday, Wednesday and Friday, on the East side of the streets running north and south, and north side of all streets running east and west."

"Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, on West side of all streets running north and south, and on the south side of all streets running east and west."

"Sunday forenoon on the east side of all streets running north and south, and the north side of all streets running east and west."

"Sunday afternoon on the west side of all streets running north and south, and the south side of all streets running east and west."

"Wasteful use of water or using an open end hose for irrigating will not be permitted."

"Water must be shut off immediately in case of fire alarm, and kept off until fire whistle blows again."

"Do not use a nozzle larger than one-quarter inch in diameter."

"Do not set sprinkler so that it will interfere with traffic on sidewalk."

"Do not have leaky faucets or fixtures on your premises."

"Do not allow water to run to waste down the gutter of streets or alleys."

"Set your sprinkler so that anyone can see that the regulation nozzle is on."

"Violators of the above rules will be punished to the full extent of the law."

COUNCIL PASSES GAS ORDINANCE KEENE PROTESTS

The city council at its meeting last night passed the so-called gasoline storage ordinance which is of interest to every auto owner in the city and will put most of them to increased expense if they desire to keep more than one gallon of gasoline or distillate on the premises, at their homes or places of business.

This ordinance had been pending for months and its passage was recommended by the state board of fire underwriters. Its passage will not only put a stop to the threatened increase in insurance rates but will decrease the fire danger and the danger to the city firemen while working at fires.

There was only one dissenting vote, that of Dr. Keene who fought the passage of the measure vigorously, claiming that the ordinance was too sweeping, would work an unnecessary expense and inconvenience to car owners in the city, and was introduced to benefit the garages and retail sellers of gasoline and distillate.

Among other features regarding the storage of explosives in the city the new ordinance provides that any person, firm or corporation can only keep more than one gallon or gasoline or one gallon of distillate in storage by having the same buried three feet below the ground in steel tanks of such construction and thickness as to meet the requirements of the National Board of Underwriters. The measure provides also that more than one gallon of gasoline or distillate can be stored by being kept in the tank of an automobile or in a two wheel push tank meeting the requirements of the board of underwriters.

The only other business transacted by the council last night was of a routine nature. Dr. J. J. Emmens, who was expected to be present and hand in his resignation as councilman, was unable to attend, and neither was his resignation sent in. The doctor who has served on the council the past two years finds that stress of business matters will prevent his serving longer.

5-CENT FARE CANDIDATE ELECTED MAYOR DENVER

DENVER, Col., May 20.—Dewey C. Bailey, commissioner of safety and excise, was elected mayor of Denver yesterday by a plurality of 8,369 votes, according to returns from all precincts today. Bailey's managers promised to restore a 5-cent car fare in Denver.

WILSON IS GRATEFUL TO U. S. CONGRESSMEN

WASHINGTON, May 21.—President Wilson today sent acknowledgment from Paris of the notification cabled him by the special senate committee that the senate had convened in extraordinary session and was ready to receive communications from the chief executive.

"Please express my appreciation to the senate committee of its courtesy," the president's message said, "and say that I have communicated with the congress in the usual manner thru the message presented yesterday and express the hope that I may soon be present in Washington to communicate to them full information with regard to the international affairs." The president requested Secretary Tamm to transmit a copy of the cablegram to the special house committee which sent the formal notification in a letter addressed to the president at the White House.
