

GEORGE W. DUNN RANCH SOLD V. H. CHAPMAN, ASHLAND

ASHLAND, May 21.—(Special).—One of the biggest realty deals for years in this vicinity has just been negotiated by the Beaver Realty company. This involves the transfer of the upper Dunn ranch, 200 acres in extent, from Geo. W. Dunn to Virgil H. Chapman. A splendid water right from Neil creek goes with this property, which is a portion of the original donation land claim in the early No. 45 series, as handed down to the Dunn heirs. The property is six miles east of town, and is at present occupied by Tom Morris, who has leased it for the next 10 years or thereabouts. The new purchaser, a member of the pioneer Chapman family of this locality, will take possession next October, after this season's crop is practically harvested.

Ed P. Moore of Berkeley, Cal., a brother of H. L. and F. W. Moore, is here visiting relatives and investigating property deals, he with his brother H. L. having bought the R. P. Neil ranch in Dead Indian, a property exceeding 500 acres in area, which the brothers will improve to a great extent. They have already installed a tractor on the place. For the time being they will "make hay while the sun shines," clover and alfalfa being specialties, while later on dairy improvements will be installed, the intent being to make the investment an ideal one along diversified lines. The place is about 17 miles east of town as the Dead Indian road lies.

COOS BAY LAND GRANT MAPS ARE AVAILABLE

Department of the Interior, United States land office, Roseburg, Ore., May 17, 1919.

The Roseburg land office has received from Washington a map showing all the land of the Coos Bay Military Wagon Road grant, of which title has been revested in the United States. The land office can now furnish township plats at \$1.00 per township, showing the location of these lands that are now being classified with view to opening to settlement, and sale of timber. Such plats will also show the location of all lands subject to entry in the particular township of which plat may be ordered.

WASHINGTON, May 21.—Organization of Republican Leader Lodge's committee on committees which will select republican members of the standing senate committees, was completed today with the acceptance by Senator Gronna, of North Dakota, of appointment as a member. With Senator McNary, of Oregon, he represents the progressive wing.

The committee today discussed the democrats' request that the republican committee majority be reduced from three to two. The republicans are understood to have consented tentatively to this ratio for the appropriations committee, but declined to cut down the three majority on the foreign relations, interstate commerce, finance and elections committees.
