### GENERAL GRAVES ASSURES RUSSIA OF U.S. GOOD WILL

VLADIVOSTOK, Siberia, April 30. (Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—Major General William S. Graves, commander of the American expeditionary forces in Siberia, has issued a message to his troops in which he declares that the American policy in Russia is the same today as when the Washington government issued its proclamation at the time of the sending of the American forces to Siberia.

The message is entitled "Our Duty in Siberia." In it Major General Graves says:

"The policy to be followed by our troops in any country is one to be determined by the executive.

"It was clearly announced in the most public and solemn manner that the United States did not contemplate any interference of any kind with the political sovereignty of Russia, any intervention in her internal affairs or any impairment of her territorial integrity.

"The United States does not intend to permit any of its agents to interfere with sovereign rights of the Russian people. Our aim has been to carry out to the letter the policy of our government. There has been no interference in the internal affairs of the Russian people and no action has been taken by the United States which could justly be said as taking sides in the differences of factions."

### REPUBLICANS TO GIVE PRIVILEGES TO ALL WOMEN

WASHINGTON, May 22.—Important subjects dealing with party organization were discussed at a republican conference here today under the auspices of the republican women's national executive committee. Will H. Haves, chairman of the republican national committee, in an address asserted that women would get the full consideration due all other individuals in the party.

Reports in organization work preparatory to the next campaign were heard from representatives from three groups of states. Mrs. Florence Porter of California, speaking for states in which women have complete franchise.

### OCCUPATION TAX WARNING ISSUED

WASHINGTON, May 22.—Persons whose occupations are subject to annual tax under the revenue act were reminded by the bureau of internal revenue today that if payment of the tax is not made by May 31 they will become liable for penalties.

Those subject to the tax include stock brokers, pawnbrokers, ship brokers, custom house brokers, proprietors of theaters, museums, and concert halls; proprietors of public exhibitions, exclusive of those held under the auspices of the religious and charitable organizations; proprietors of bowling alleys, riding academies and shooting galleries, and persons operating automobiles for hire.

### COMMENCING THURSDAY, MAY 22, 1919

Irrigation Hours Will Be as Follows:

#### 4 a. m. to 11 p. m.

**MONDAY, WEDNESDAY AND FRIDAY**, on the EAST side of the Streets running North and South, and NORTH side of all Streets running EAST and West.

**TUESDAY, THURSDAY AND SATURDAY**, on WEST side of all Streets running North and South, and on the SOUTH side of all Streets running East and West.

**SUNDAY FORENOON** on the EAST side of all Streets running North and South, and the NORTH side of all Streets running East and West.

**SUNDAY AFTERNOON** on the WEST side of all Streets running North and South, and the SOUTH side of all Streets running East and West.

Wasteful use of water or USING AN OPEN END HOSE for irrigating will not be permitted.

**WATER MUST BE SHUT OFF IMMEDIATELY IN CASE OF FIRE ALARM, AND KEPT OFF UNTIL FIRE WHISTLE BLOWS AGAIN.**

**DO NOT USE A NOZZLE LARGER THAN ONE-QUARTER INCH IN DIAMETER.**

Do not set sprinkler so that it will interfere with traffic on sidewalk.

Do not have leaky faucets or fixtures on your premises.

**DO NOT ALLOW WATER TO RUN TO WASTE DOWN THE GUTTER OF STREETS OR ALLEYS.**
