Mr. and Mrs. Gus Ditsworth motored out to the valley one day last week.

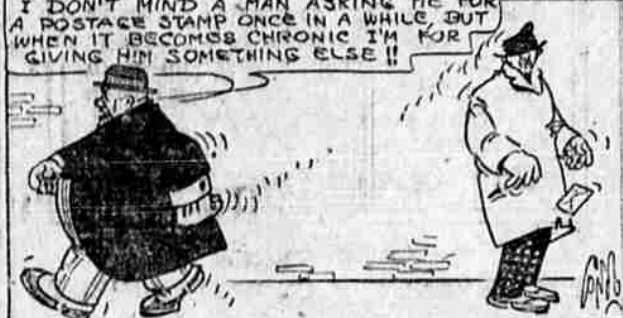
