

BIG OPENING OF ASHLAND NAT IS SATURDAY EVENT

The big entertainment of the week will be a veritable "spring opening" at the Nat. on Saturday evening, May 24, consequently the interior of the mammoth edifice has been undergoing extensive repairs at the hands of Harold Trezigan, the new manager of the property, with the result that every utility pertaining to the establishment will be in shipshape order. The summer season will be ushered in by opening the pools on Saturday noon. There will be a dance on Saturday evening, with music by the local high school band and the jazz orchestra from Medford. All amusements centering at the Nat will be conducted on a high plane, and no "rough stuff" will be tolerated. Chaperones at the opening function, in addition to an extended list of patrons will include Mr. and Mrs. E. V. Carter, Mr. and Mrs. F. D. Wagner, Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Gale, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Dickey, Dr. and Mrs. Gordon MacCracken, and Mrs. Ella Mills. The manager will give instruction in swimming, and certain hours on Tuesday and Thursday of each week will be reserved for the ladies. The intent is to make the Nat a center for good, clean, manly sport, in addition to the unrivaled swimming and bathing privileges which it affords. Preliminary showers will be a requisite before entering the public pools, the waters in which will be changed several times weekly.

Memorial Sunday, preceding Decoration day, will be observed at the Presbyterian church, May 25, at which the Grand Army Post, Relief Corps and the local contingent of the National Guard will attend in a body.

The programs are varied, embracing catchy, popular and classic selections. The initial concert incorporated eight numbers, only one of which, "Ragged Ike," was a march, which even suggested ragtime melodies.

The salvage depot, conducted for months past by members of the Civic Improvement club under Red Cross auspices, has been closed permanently, having fulfilled its mission, which was to gather odds and ends from every branch of trade, and as its name implied, retail the salvaged stock to best advantage. Results exceeded all expectations, and hundreds of dollars through this agency have been diverted to various channels with which the Red Cross is identified. The salvage corps are grateful for patronage received and in due season will render a statement of stewardship well performed.

Sheep shearing on the Herrin ranches across Bear Creek, yielded good returns, the fleece averaging well on the basis of 10 pounds each, which at prevailing prices of 50c or better for wool made the yield per head about \$5. The flock is in the neighborhood of 1,000 and is in fine condition this season.

Harold Trezigan, new director at the Nat, addressed the high school on Wednesday afternoon, his talk relating to the navy, the higher education and nautical pastimes, themes regarding which he is well posted, inasmuch as he has served in the navy, is a university graduate and an authority on athletics. HOLDING RURAL SCHOOL MEET AT TALENT TODAY

Today is the big day on the oval at the Talent school grounds where all of the schools of the second and third class in the county are competing in 54 field and track events. This is the fifth annual field and track meet of the Southern Oregon Athletic Association and the Olympic cup will again be the chief trophy for the larger schools, including Central Point, Eagle Point, Butte Falls, Gold Hill, Rogue River, Jacksonville, Phoenix and Talent.

The cup was first won by the Gold Hill schools, then by Central Point. The third year it went to Talent and the fourth to Phoenix which now holds it and who will attempt today to keep the same. The school winning the cup three times is to have permanent possession of it.

The rural schools also complete for a separate trophy which consists of a hand ball outfit. This is being offered by the Olympic society of the Talent school and will pass into permanent possession of the rural school winning the greatest number of points at this meet. Several schools including Willow Springs, Foots Creek, West Side, Oak Grove, Toledo, North Phoenix, Independence, Howard, Applegate and several others, including some as far away as Trail have been making preparations for the meet and have been giving the school children regular training in the different events.

The people of Talent are backing the event with excellent community spirit and assisted the school in serving lunch during the noon hour to those who did not care to bother with a picnic basket.

Irvin Bebb from Texas and Robert H. Holmes from Washington, D. C. have been released from the U. S. army and are now at their homes in this city.

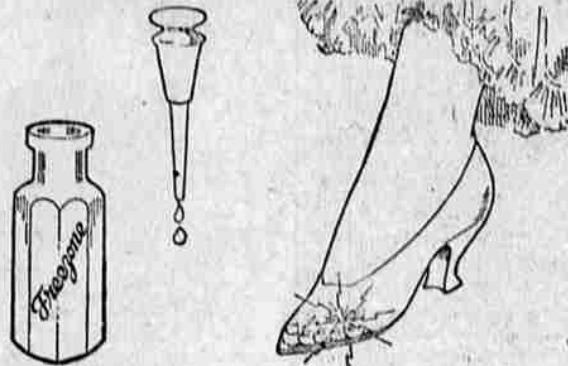
George Ford and John Welch were in this week from the Lewis sheep camp where they are shearing sheep and soaking wool.
