LET THE COUNTIES DECIDE.

THE prejudice against taxes is deep seated. It dates back to feudal days when taxes represented a tribute without return. And it will probably be many generations before taxes are regarded rationally,—looked upon with the toleration accorded other expenditures.

A man may invest \$2,000 in a motor car, which costs him ten cents a mile, and is in the hospital half the time, but nine times out of ten he won't complain of the expense, even if he knows of it.

But let that same man pay \$50 more in taxes, and whether he gets free use of a million dollar pavement or pure instead of infected water, he will yell ruin and damnation until the cows come home. This is human nature. And while human nature changes, it changes very, very slowly.

All of which makes it certain that the money measures to be voted upon at the special election will have hard sledding. There will be an initial prejudice very difficult to overcome.

Nevertheless most of the measures are commendable and should be passed.

The first one on the ballot, would increase the county indebtedness from two to six per cent, for the construction of good roads. Without studying the question, a number of people, will no doubt vote "no" on the general assumption this will increase the tax burden.

But it won't. The measure merely makes it possible for any county in the state to increase its indebtedness if a majority in that county so vote. Jackson county should have more money for road maintenance and construction. But if a majority of the people oppose this, the passage of this measure will have no effect in this county whatever.

In other words the amendment merely gives each county home rule in road building, within six per cent of the county valuation. There is no valid objection to this. The measure should pass.

While the feat of the NC-4 naturally fills every American with pride, the exploit of Hawker in his jump-off direct for Ireland with no navy to aid him, must be granted the more daring—the more thrilling adventure. We trust the American navy will be among the first to congratulate him on his safe arrival.

A flight will also be given in Ashland, the plan of having one valley flight being abandoned. The planes will perform during the Rose festival and then are expected to return to Ashland for the big celebration there July 4th. At this time there will probably be a second exhibition arranged for Medford.
