would reach the coast of Portugal before darkness tonight, thus achieving the coveted honor of making the first trans-Atlantic flight. United States seaplane NC-4 started for Lisbon this morning at 10:18 o'clock Greenwich time, or 6:18 a. m. New York time.

The crew of the seaplane, which was the same as that which made the memorable flight from New Foundland to the Azores, boarded the plane an hour before sunrise, but it was not until several hours later that the giant machine taxied outside the breakwater, headed to windward and rose gracefully into the air. She circled the harbor and then headed for her destination amid cheers from the stevedores and soldiers who lined the decks of the ships in the harbor and the crowds on the piers, together with the shrieks of whistles from all the steam craft within sight.

The NC-4 passed station ship No. 1, the destroyer Thompson, between 60 and 70 miles east of Ponta Delgada at 11:13 Greenwich time, Delgada at 11:38 Greenwich time (7:38 a. m. Washington time) Rear Admiral Jackson reported. The message simply reported the successful starting of the flight.

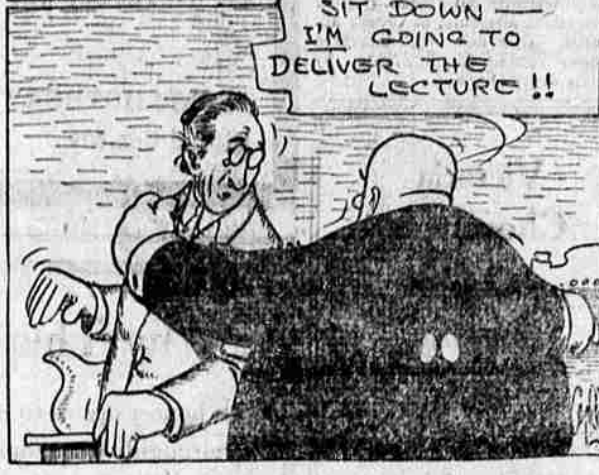
