

# AEROPLANES WILL FLY AT ASHLAND RODEO JULY 3-5

ASHLAND, May 30.—The big celebration here July 3, 4 and 5 is assured and airplane flights will be one of the chief attractions not only during the celebration dates, but a preliminary visit of aircraft machines will be a novelty afforded by a squad of planes maneuvering herabouts incident to the voyage to and from Portland during the rose carnival period in that city. But to revert to the celebration proper, it is only necessary to state at present that all arrangements are being made to have air flights and other big attractions here during celebration week. A canvassing committee of nearly a dozen is conducting the preliminary financial drive, the goal set being the raising of a fund of at least \$5,000 to back the enterprise. Performers and stock are already engaged for the round event of the carnival, and every attraction incident to the big show will be staged on a greater extent than ever. The Commercial club is behind the celebration movement, which indirectly implies that citizens in general are in favor of celebrating this year to the full limit.

The remains of the late A. L. Irwin have arrived from San Francisco, and funeral services will probably be held on Saturday, conducted by the Elks. A special policeman for the Southern Pacific at the Gerber terminal, Mr. Irwin met his death in the railroad yards there last Tuesday evening, the result of accident.

Projects on which bids will be received and contracts awarded if bids are satisfactory are in Baker, Benton, Clackamas, Coos, Curry, Douglas, Jackson, Multnomah, Umatilla, Washington, Wheeler, Yamhill and Grant counties.

The Jackson county units are 8.15 miles grading on the Green Springs mountain road, at Jenny creek and 10.9 miles of grading on the Pacific highway at Green Springs mountain summit.
