U. S. LABOR FAVORS SOLDIERS' FARMS

WASHINGTON, May 31.—Passage of legislation to carry out Secretary Lane's project for farms for soldiers was urged before the house public lands committee today by Henry Sterling, legislative representative of the American Federation of Labor.

"There is absolutely no division among the three and one-half million members of the American Federation of Labor as to the desire for this legislation," said Mr. Sterling.

Representative Timberlake, republican of Colorado, told the committee "sentiment generally in Colorado favors the legislation, adding that the state legislature had granted money to be used in cooperating with the government in the development of land settlements.

# GENERAL STRIKE OF TELEGRAPHERS IS THREATENED

MONTREAL, May 31. — S. J. Konenkamp, president of the Commercial Telegraphers' Union, confirmed here today reports from Washington that a general strike of telegraph and electrical workers throughout the United States would be called Monday unless discharged members of the union in Atlanta, Ga., were reinstated. The union leader, who will leave tonight for Washington, declared the strike had been called to enforce recognition of the right to unionize.

A vote in favor of the strike was taken May 5, Mr. Konenkamp said, the demands, in addition to the right of organization, including the privilege of collective bargaining, higher wages and standardization of pay.

ATLANTA, Ga., May 31.—An ultimatum threatening a strike of all union employees at 3 p. m. Monday unless the Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph company reinstates union telephone operators alleged to have been discharged recently and grants recognition of the union, was presented to officials of the company today by a committee of employees of the company.


