

FULL TEXT PEACE TREATY PUBLISHED ONLY IN GERMANY

BERLIN, May 29.—(By the Associated Press.)—German newspapers are commenting more and more upon the alleged fact that the full peace terms have not as yet been published in any entente country, saying that, on the contrary, the German League of Nations Union has issued the complete text in German, French and English, and is giving it widest circulation.

It is claimed these methods deprive the entente peoples of the opportunity to judge of the attitude and justice of the German counter claims.
