HIGHEST VOTING IN HISTORY OF CITY TODAY'S ELECTION

Indications this afternoon were that Jackson county would break a record in the state election today by casting the lightest vote ever known in the county's history. It will take a tremendous outpouring early this evening of voters to even make the vote a respectable looking one, and this is not looked for. The polls are open until 8 p. m.

The light vote is due to two reasons, the chief one being a total lack of interest, and the other is that so many voters are too busy with orchard and ranch work to take time to cast their ballots.

"The lightest vote ever known," tersely remarked Chauncey Florey, county clerk, when questioned at 3 p. m. today about how the election was progressing. He had heard from all parts of the county, and the story was the same everywhere.

In Medford, especially in the business district, only half a dozen votes had been cast by noon and a few more by early afternoon. It is anticipated that the full result of the voting in Jackson county would be known by 9 o'clock tonight.

County Clerk Florey reports considerable difficulty early this forenoon in getting the precinct election boards filled out, as so many men failed to report on the job, giving as a reason that they were too busy to serve. The situation was straightened out by early forenoon, however. Many women served on the boards. It is estimated that the percentage of women membership on the boards was 60 per cent.

The election failed to go smoothly in other particulars. The various election boards of Medford had to erect the voting booths in their own precincts, as Sheriff Terrell and his deputies were too busy with other matters and it is reported that the sheriff could not hire men to do this work at the prevailing price allowed by the county court. When the judges and clerks arrived at each precinct they found the ballot boxes and booths lying outside and had to get busy and erect the booths inside.

At the federal employment office yesterday there were calls from the ranchers for twenty-seven hay hands, but Superintendent James could only find eleven men to fill the calls. This morning more ranchers sent in calls for six hay hands and only two could be found.

H. KUBLI, ACCUSED OF CATTLE STEALING ELUDES AUTHORITIES

A search is being conducted all over the state and in adjoining states for Harold Kubli, the young Applegate rancher arrested the latter part of last week charged with stealing a cow from Fred Offenbacher, another Applegate rancher, since which time two warrants have been issued in this county charging Kubli with cattle stealing from other ranchers in the Applegate district.

Kubli failed to show up at his preliminary hearing at Grants Pass yesterday forenoon and his present whereabouts are unknown. It is claimed that he and his family and their auto have been away from home since last Sunday. Sheriff Terrell, with the two Jackson county warrants, was at Grants Pass yesterday forenoon ready to serve them if Kubli should be released on the charge preferred by Mr. Offenbacher.

The authorities of Jackson and Josephine counties suspect that Kubli and family are in Portland and vicinity, where he has relatives, and got into touch Monday noon with the Portland authorities. Several telegrams and long distance phone messages passed between the sheriff's office and Portland officials last night and this forenoon.

The original arrest of Kubli, who is about 22 years old, caused a great sensation throughout the Applegate district. The two warrants sworn out here against Kubli are as follows: Clinton Cook charges that Kubli stole a steer from him on May 10, and J. A. O'Brien alleges that Kubli stole a cow from him on May 1. These warrants were not sworn out until after a thorough investigation in which the hides of the alleged stolen animals were located in Medford.

Kubli had retained Attorney Gus Newbury of Medford to defend him at his preliminary hearing in Grants Pass, and Mr. Newbury was there to perform that duty. The Grants Pass Courier contains the following account of Kubli's disappearance:

"Harold Kubli, the Applegate rancher accused of stealing cattle and who was to have appeared here before Justice Holman at 10 o'clock today, failed to appear. He was out on \$500 cash bond.

"This forenoon, just before the hour set for the trial, about 25 ranchers from the Applegate section were at the courthouse, presumably to appear as witnesses against Kubli.

"There is a warrant out in Jackson county, also, for Mr. Kubli, and efforts are being made by officers to locate him."

The Comrade club will go on a hike Wednesday evening. The members will meet at the library at 4:15. In police court yesterday afternoon, Harry Owsley of near Central Point pleaded guilty to the charge of driving an automobile when intoxicated and was fined \$25 and costs by Judge Taylor. Owsley ran his car into another auto which was standing on Sixth street by the Hotel Holland yesterday noon, badly wrecking both cars.

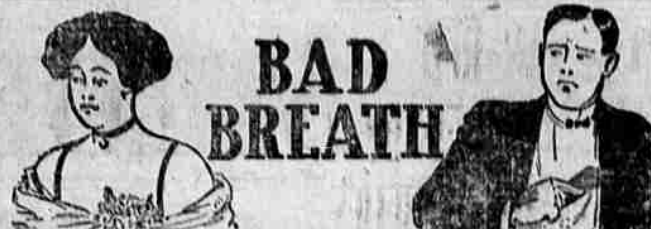
