1 MEASURE
ONLY FAILS
TO GET BY

Incomplete Returns All Parts of the State Indicate Governor Measure Failed—Medford Votes for Entire Program—County Incomplete Indicates Success of All Measures But Bonding Bills and Hospital Amendment.

PORTLAND, June 4.—Returns from all parts of Oregon today indicated the success of all reconstruction measures on yesterday's ballot. The only measure voted upon which apparently met defeat was that creating the office of lieutenant-governor in the state. This was running behind by several thousand votes today.

The Roosevelt highway bond issue, the county debt increase for roads, the soldiers' educational aid measure, the irrigation bond interest guarantee, and the market roads tax bill all were carried by large margins. The reconstruction hospital amendment and reconstruction bonding bill apparently were successful, but by smaller majorities.

With the Medford and Ashland vote complete, but only scattered returns from the rest of the county the vote on the measures in Tuesday's election stands as follows:

Six per cent tax—Yes 440, No 372.
Hospital amendment—Yes 391, No 405.
Irrigation—Yes 434, No 360.
Five million bond amendment—Yes 383, No 422.
Lieutenant-governor—Yes 352, No 444.
Roosevelt highway—Yes 495, No 356.
Bond bill—Yes 362, No 449.
Soldiers and sailors—Yes 541, No 313.
Market roads—Yes 470, No 323.

Five Measures Pass
With the very light vote cast, it is certain the following measures passed in Jackson county: Six per cent tax, irrigation aid, Roosevelt highway, soldiers and sailors educational bill, and mill tax for market roads. The other measures are doubtful and very likely will only be decided by the official count, with the exception of lieutenant-governor, which has unquestionably been defeated.

Medford Votes Yes
In Medford every measure carried, although the lieutenant governor only got over by one vote. The second largest negative vote was cast against the 5 million bonding bill, 189 against to 234 for. In every precinct in the city every measure carried but the lieutenant governor and bonding bill, with the exception of South Medford which voted against every item on the ballot.

In Medford as elsewhere the total vote cast was the smallest in history. In South Medford for example, where 169 votes were registered, 18 votes were cast Tuesday. In West Medford where 299 votes were registered, 41 were cast Tuesday. It was the same story all along the line. In Park where 116 votes were registered, 19 were cast yesterday.

Ashland Favors 4 Items
In Ashland where there are approximately 1800 voters, 354 ballots were cast Tuesday. There are 106 voters in Willow Springs district, 14

INFLUENZA SHIP
TO CARRY AID
TO UNALASKA

SAN FRANCISCO, June 4.—In response to calls for help from the influenza-raged inhabitants of Unalaska and territory around Bristol Bay, the cruiser Marblehead was expected to clear from here today with a physicians' and nurses' unit on board. She will stop at Port Townsend to take on more doctors and nurses and supplies and will go from there to Unalaska.

The Marblehead is being sent in response to appeals from the Alaska Commercial company agent at Dutch Harbor and from others in the epidemic regions. Dr. W. T. Harris, surgeon of the United States public health service here, recruited the local unit with the co-operation of the navy department.

2 KILLED IN RIOT
AT WILLYS-OVERLAND
PLANT, CALL TROOPS

TOLEDO, Ohio, June 4.—Operations at the Willys-Overland Automobile company were at a standstill today as a result of rioting last night in which two persons were shot to death and seventeen injured. The plant opened a week ago Monday, after two weeks of idleness. Clarence A. Earl, vice president and general manager of the company, announced no attempt would be made to operate the plant, which has been affected by labor disturbances involving 13,000 employees, pending a reply from Governor Cox to an appeal from Mayor Schreiber for troops.

TIE UP OF ENTIRE
WIRE SYSTEM IS
CHIEF'S PROPHECY

ATLANTA, Ga., June 4.—Union telegraphers employed by the Western Union Telegraph company at Atlanta went on strike today in sympathy with the telephone operators of the Southern Bell and Atlanta Telephone companies, who left their switchboards Monday.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—S. J. Koenigsmann, president of the Commercial Telegraphers' Union of America, said here today he believed the Atlanta strike would spread until it assumed nationwide proportions and result in a tie-up of the country's telegraph and telephone communication.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 4.—A strike call for June 16 is being sent out from the headquarters of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers here, Charles P. Ford, secretary, said today. If demands submitted to Postmaster General Burleson are not complied with by that date, 60,000 men and 60,000 operators will strike, he said.

Mr. Ford said that the electrical workers asked the postmaster-general that a general order be issued allowing the employees the right to organize and bargain through their representatives; that in case of reduction in wages union men be given preferential employment.

U. S. MARINES LAND
AT COSTA RICA

SAN SALVADOR, Republic of Salvador, June 4.—America marines have been landed at Puntarenas and Port Limon, Costa Rica, because of the revolution against the government headed by General Tinoco, according to dispatches printed in newspapers here.

The revolution in Costa Rica has been going on for two months, but has been attracting considerable attention in Central America countries for only four weeks. Forces said to have been recruited from political exiles formed bands along the Nicaraguan frontier near Lake Nicaragua and advanced southward, clashing on several occasions with forces commanded by Joaquin Tinoco, Costa Rican minister of war. The fighting has been restricted almost entirely to the mountainous country near the Nicaraguan border, although recently skirmishes further south have been reported. The situation is obscure, owing to the fact that reports from Costa Rica have been of a conflicting nature. Puntarenas is a port on the Pacific coast of Costa Rica and is the Pacific terminus of the railroad extending across Costa Rica to Port Limon, which is the most important harbor on the Atlantic side of the country.

RAILROADS ASK HIGHER
RATES SMELTER PRODUCTS

WASHINGTON, June 4.—General increases in freight rates on bullion and smelter products were asked today by a number of railroads.

Increases from producing points in the northwest to various destinations throughout the United States were asked by the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul, Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific, Missouri Pacific and Oregon Short Line railroads.

SOLDIERS SPLIT
IN 2 FACTIONS
CANADA STRIKE

Two Parades Staged in Winnipeg, One Favoring Walkout, other Opposed—Govt. Troops Held in Readiness for Trouble—Canadian Officers Urge Kicking Out Radicals.

WINNIPEG, June 4.—Parades by both factions of returned soldiers got under way shortly before noon today. The returned soldiers who refused to approve the general strike marched around the parliament buildings.

The other parade moved up Portage avenue and passed within four blocks of the parliament building. These parades continued up the avenue and did not turn in the direction of parliament.

James A. Duncanson, secretary of the trades and labor council of Seattle, arrived in Winnipeg this morning and will address the strikers at Victoria park this afternoon.

Union engineers in bakeries and creameries here were called out this morning by the central strike committee. First reports said most of the men obeyed the order. Some of the men driving milk and bread wagons also quit work.

The parade of the returned soldiers who refused to approve the sympathetic strike returned from the parliament building at 1:30 p. m. The marchers carried banners bearing the inscription, "Down With Bolshevism," "We uphold our duly elected constitutional government," "Deport the enemy alien," etc.

The gathering around the parliament building was estimated to include more than 2,000 soldiers. Several Canadian army officers addressed the gathering and denounced the demonstrations of the past few days.

Down With Aliens

"If aliens and other demonstrators attempt to interfere with this orderly demonstration, we will act as true Canadians should," said one of the speakers.

While the parade demonstrations were in progress the central strike committee was calling out union workers who thus far were not on strike. Motion picture operators were ordered to quit work. Efforts of the strike leaders, however, were directed principally against the distribution of foodstuffs.

There were various indications that the struggle, now in its twentieth day, was approaching a climax. Soldiers were held in readiness for action at barracks.

Fifteen minutes after the first parade left the parliament grounds the parade of strike sympathizers arrived at the building.

Hundreds of men in workmen's clothes were in the parade which moved from parliament to the business district. With British and Dominion banners snapping and marchers whistling a military tune, the parade swept through the downtown section without the slightest opposition. One banner said: "To hell with the alien enemy: God save the king."

The two parades have not met thus far.

ONCE MORE REPORT
PETROGRAD'S FALL IS
OFFICIALLY DENIED

LONDON, June 4.—A Russian wireless message received here today claims that the Bolsheviks have successfully undertaken a counter-offensive against the Estonians and the North Russian troops advancing along the Gatchina railway.

LONDON, June 4.—Bolshevik propaganda was being transmitted today from the wireless station at Tsarskoe-Selo, indicating that the report that Petrograd had been occupied or surrounded was unlikely.

\$31,300,000 FARM BILL
PASSES THE HOUSE

WASHINGTON, June 4.—The \$31,300,000 agricultural appropriation bill was passed today by the house with only one dissenting vote and sent to the senate. A proposal to direct the house committee to increase the \$1,500,000 appropriation for farm demonstration work by \$1,000,000 was defeated.

AUSTRIA REFUSES TO
ACCEPT PEACE TERMS
PRESENTED AT PARIS

VIENNA, June 4.—The Austrian government has decided unanimously that the peace terms presented at St. Germain on Monday are unacceptable, the Neues Abendblatt says.

PARIS, June 4.—The council of four met this forenoon. Experts on territorial questions and reparations met with the council. It is understood that the clauses of the Austrian peace treaty dealing with reparations now have been completed.

STRONG SENTIMENT
TO MEET GERMAN
OFFER INDEMNITY

(BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS)
June 4.—There is reason to believe, according to advices from Paris, that the council of four will reach a decision by Thursday as to the reply to the German counter proposals to the peace terms. Allied experts are being held in Paris today to draft memoranda to be submitted to the council of four.

Premier Clemenceau is understood to maintain firmly that there can be no important changes in the clauses of the treaty to which the Germans have entered their strongest objections. There are indications, however, of a strong undercurrent of sentiment to meet the German offer of a definite sum of 100,000,000,000 marks as indemnity instead of the indeterminate sum that might be demanded under the terms as presently framed.

It also seems possible that the clauses of the treaty relating to Silesia may be modified so that Germany may be able to receive supplies of grain, coal and other commodities despite the transfer to Poland of sovereignty of that region.

That the Germans have not said their last word in objecting to phases of the treaty is indicated by a memorandum which has been drafted at Versailles by German experts, who seek to refute allied charges as to the guilt of Germany for the war. This memorandum will, it is said, be presented as a reply to the report made by the inter-allied commission on responsibility for the conflict.

The supreme economic council has appointed a committee, to study a plan for the liquidation of the world's food control and to devise plans to meet the problems that will arise after the coming harvest.

LIEUT.-COL. WATSON
TO COMMAND THE
AIR FLYING CIRCUS

PORTLAND, June 4.—On the eve of the Victory Rose Festival, June 11, 12 and 13, every individual on points to the most successful of all festivals.

A squadron of seven—possibly eight—airplanes, six J4Hs, one de Havilland and one huge Martin bomber, will fly from Mather field, Sacramento, under the command of Lieutenant Colonel Watson. It is possible that General Monohor, commanding officer of the field, will take the flight in the Martin bomber, which is being tuned up in anticipation of the flight. These planes will arrive in Portland late June 10th, after the trip over the Siskiyous and stops at Medford, Roseburg, Eugene, Salem and possibly other western Oregon cities. They will remain here to take part in the huge aerial circus and at times will carry civilian passengers on flights over the city.

Rear Admiral Fullam aboard his flagship, the Minneapolis, will bring a fleet of warships from southern waters. Two seaplanes will be brought by the Minneapolis, the first to be seen in action in the northwest. Salem, Oregon City, Eugene, Madras, Roseburg, Brownsville, Hillsboro, Primeville, and LaGrande in Oregon will all enter floats in the festival pageants, while Seattle, Tacoma, Port Angeles, Chehalis, Montesano, Ridgefield, Kalama, Camas and Centralia in Washington will take part. Other Oregon and Washington cities have yet to make formal entry although their presence has been assured. Vancouver, B. C., with its float, will give the festival an international rating.

GRAND PARADE
WINS DERBY AT
EPSOM DOWNS

World's Classic Sporting Event Renews Glory—Aeroplane Transportation to Race New Feature—King and Queen on Hand But Have No Entry.

LONDON, June 4.—Grand parade won the derby at Epsom Downs today. Buchanan was second and Paper Money third. Thirteen horses ran. Derby Day, the world's greatest popular sporting event, returned after leaving a blank on the British calendar for four years. With the early morning the population began a progress toward Epsom Downs comparable with the migration of the tribes of Israel.

"This isn't a crowd; it is a nation," said a French writer of Derby Day. The people traveled in trains, buses, four-in-hands, delivery wagons, donkey carts, on horseback, afoot and, as a sign of the new era, by airplane. Aviators booked one hundred passengers going to Epsom Downs, although the machines were forbidden to fly within two miles of the course. Thousands camped last night near the race course in tents, and caterers stored tons of provisions there, their supplies including more than 100,000 bottles of beer.

The spectacle at the race course lacked nothing of the pre-war color today and had a strong tinge of khaki. King George, Queen Mary with the Prince of Wales and Princess Mary, drove from the station in landaus. All the familiar figures, from the Earl of Londsdale, dean of English sportsmen, wearing his silk hat, to bookmakers from all parts of the kingdom, were present.

Major Waldorf Astor's Buchanan was among the starters rated as a possibility. There had been much interest in All Alone, because this racer was owned and had been trained by Lady Torrington. The king's stables had nothing good enough to start in the classic event.

DIRECT SHIP LINE
TO SOUTH AMERICA

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Plans for establishment of direct steamship lines connecting American Atlantic, Gulf and Pacific ports with South and Central America were laid before the Pan-American commercial conference today by Chairman Hurley of the shipping board. They call for direct lines from New York to Brazil, Argentina and Chile; from New Orleans or Mobile to the west coast of South America, and Seattle and other Pacific ports to Western South American ports.

FIRST U. S. CONTINGENT
LEAVES NORTH RUSSIA

ARCHANGLE, Tuesday, June 3.—(By The Associated Press.)—A contingent of American infantry which has been serving in Northern Russia boarded a transport today for the journey to the United States. These are the first American troops detailed to sail for home.

The detachment will go to Brest. Six companies of the 339th infantry, aggregating 1,600 men, or approximately one-third of the American force on the Archangel front, comprise the first detachment to leave. They embarked at Archangel, the winter port of Archangel.

YAQUI INDIANS KILL AN
AMERICAN SONORA UPRISING

NOGALES, Ariz., June 4.—Yaqui Indians in the La Colorado mining district of Sonora, Mexico, are terrorizing the community, according to advices received here today. Another murder was reported today, that of Charles W. P. Tervote, mining engineer, employed by the American Mining and Smelting company.

Widow Millionaire Murdered

SAN FRANCISCO, June 4.—Mrs. Sarah Saira Coburn, widow of Loren Coburn, millionaire of Pescadero, near here, was found murdered near her home at Pescadero today, according to word received by the San Francisco police.

Governor Lister Sinking

SEATTLE, June 4.—Little hope was expressed here today for the recovery of Governor Ernest Lister, ill in a Seattle hospital. The attending physician indicated the executive's condition was grave.

PORTLAND GIVES A
ROUSING WELCOME TO
THE 20TH ENGINEERS

PORTLAND, June 4.—Welcoming groups of women folk were as thick as machine gun nests in the Argonne when 271 members of the 20th Engineers, three officers and 40 casuals from various infantry units arrived at the union depot here today. With the same efficiency displayed as in France, the soldiers waded in and took possession of the groups, and presently were marching up Victory way, followed and surrounded by their willing captives.

The arrivals were entertained here pending their departure tonight for Camp Lewis. There were men of the 8th, 9th, 11th, 12th and 23rd companies of the 3rd battalion on the train which arrived here today.

PARIS WALKS TO
WORK, 500,000 GO
OUT ON STRIKE

PARIS, June 4.—Paris walked to work this morning, no subways, team cars or taxi buses being in operation because of the strike here.

Reports early this morning seem to indicate that the strike was becoming worse and was showing a tendency to gain in all trades where there are outstanding differences between the employers and men, even sometimes against the judgment of the strike leaders. Although there were some 350,000 on strike in the Paris district yesterday, it was said early today that the number might be 500,000 before night. Everything is proceeding with the most perfect calm and there have been no untoward incidents.

The electrical workers in the power station at Vetry joined in the strike yesterday, stopping the street cars in Versailles and closing down all industries using electricity in the district. By evening, however, the military authorities had taken possession and the current was turned on again.

REPORT CHIHUAHUA
NOT YET TAKEN

EL PASO, Texas, June 4.—The report that Chihuahua City was attacked by Generals Angeles and Villa June 1, arose from the fact that a battle took place at Santa Isabel, 12 miles from there, May 31, according to a statement by Elias De Lao, private secretary to Governor Andres Ortiz of the state of Chihuahua, who arrived here today.

DANIELS ORDERS REDUCTION
OF NAVY TO 250,000 MEN

WASHINGTON, June 4.—Secretary Daniels today ordered reduction of the naval personnel to 250,000 men or less by July 1. Commandants of all shore stations and districts are directed to discharge immediately every man who could possibly be spared without impairing the efficiency of the navy.

On June 1 there were approximately 277,000 men in the navy, of whom about 125,000 were at shore stations.

SHIPPING BOARD MEETS WITH
SHIP BUILDERS AND OWNERS

WASHINGTON, June 4.—With the object of promoting efficiency and industrial harmony in the operation of the American merchant marine, a three-day conference of shipping board officials, shipowners and operators and representatives of organizations of seamen, longshoremen and other classes of marine labor opened today upon the call of Chairman Hurley of the shipping board.

H. L. Walther, W. G. Steel, J. W. Dressler, Jap Andrews, B. W. Paul and S. S. Smith, representing the Medford Commercial club, meet representatives of the Ashland and Grd Grants Pass clubs at Ashland this evening to perfect the organization for exploiting the resources and scenic advantages of southern Oregon.

NATION MOVES
TO WIPE OUT
RADICAL CLAN

New Bureau Created To Hunt Anarchy Heads—Russian Clique in New York "Brains" of Monday Bomb Plots—J. W. W. President Linked to Scheme by Card "1001."

WASHINGTON, June 4.—It was evident here today that the efforts of anarchists to create a reign of terror thru attempts on lives of prominent men in eight cities Monday night not only failed but has brought action of government that is expected to wipe out the anarchists themselves.

The announcement by Attorney General A. Mitchell Palmer that the purposes of the department of justice are the same now as they were before was followed by a statement telling of creation of a new bureau by the department with William J. Flynn as its head, which will have as its paramount duty the crushing of the anti-government movement.

Agents of the federal government throughout the country and detective forces in scores of other cities today renewed with vigor their efforts to run down those responsible for Monday night's bomb explosions.

Although the authorities are working behind a tightly drawn veil of secrecy, for obvious reasons it was said that despite intimations yesterday that the identity of the man killed here by his own bomb when he attempted to assassinate Attorney General Palmer had been established, no tangible clues that might lead to apprehension of the plotters had been found.

PITTSBURGH, June 4.—Evidence was in the hands of the police today that anarchists responsible for bomb explosions at the homes of Judge W. H. S. Thompson of the United States district court, and W. W. Stray, chief inspector of the bureau of immigration, Monday night, were operating under orders from Russian radicals' headquarters at 133 East Fifteenth street, New York.

Superintendent R. J. Alderdice of the bureau of police said John Johnson, president of the local I. W. W., arrested after a fight with detectives came to Pittsburgh from New York two weeks ago at the instance of "No. 1001." William Haywood, president of the national I. W. W., according to Alderdice, bears the pass No. 1001.

Johnson, who the police say, is directing genius of the bomb plot here, is held with a score of other alleged anarchists. Ball was refused in each case. In a partial confession, Johnson is said to have named a Cleveland man as the marker of the bombs exploded here. This man, whose name the police withheld, also is said to have operated under orders of the radical headquarters in New York and is believed to have gone to Chicago after the explosion here.

WANT UNCLE SAM
GERMAN PARTNER

BERLIN, Tuesday, June 3.—(By Associated Press.) There seems to be a widespread demand on the part of the Germans that efforts be made to induce America to enter into a sort of limited alliance with Germany or take protectorate over this country, giving Germany financial aid and protection and taking in return the lion's share of the profits of the country's industrial activities.

Privy Councillor Bergmann, formerly a partner in the German-Edison companies and one of the largest electrical magnates here, suggests a German-American partnership with America the senior and the controlling partner.

SNYDER VICTOR IN
LOS ANGELES VOTE

LOS ANGELES, June 4.—Meredith P. Snyder defeated P. T. Woodman, incumbent, for mayor in the municipal election yesterday, according to official returns early today from 685 precincts out of 755. The vote so far counted gave Snyder 41,709, Woodman 25,620.

Mr. Snyder is a banker. He has served three terms as mayor of this city.
