

### J. T. GAGNON LEASES JACKSONVILLE R. R. FROM MR. BARNUM

The Jacksonville railroad which has been operated for several years by the Southern Oregon Traction company, is about to pass into strange hands, and in fact most of it has already done so. On May 30 the railroad property was bought in at public sale by W. S. Barnum, its former owner and who held the unpaid mortgage bonds on it. The circuit court confirmation of the sale will be given ten days after the sale. Mr. Barnum was the only bidder, and it is said that his bid was \$45,000, while the amount of mortgage bonds due was \$65,000.

Friday afternoon, pending the confirmation of the sale, a deal was completed by which Mr. Barnum leased the railroad property for one year to Joe Gagnon, the lumber mill operator and box manufacturer, who will greatly improve the property and operate the railroad.

Included in the lease are ten flat cars, two box cars, two railroad coaches, two engines, and six rock or gravel cars. All of the property has already been turned over to Mr. Gagnon, except the street car, and he will not be given possession of it until the court has confirmed the sale and the receiver, Attorney T. W. Miles, who is operating the street car line, has been relieved from duty.

Mr. Gagnon announced Friday that he will change the name of the railroad to the Rogue River Valley Railroad, will establish a new street car schedule, repaint and burnish up the street car and uniform the crew. He will operate the railroad in connection with his lumber and logging operations and for hauling general freight between Jacksonville and Medford.

### FLYING CIRCUS IN MEDFORD MONDAY MORNING, JUNE 9

The flying circus composed of seven and perhaps eight aeroplanes will arrive in Medford some time Monday morning, the exact time will be announced later. The first flight will be in Ashland. The planes will then fly over the valley and land on the Gore tract on the Jacksonville road which is being prepared today for their arrival.

There will be five regulation aeroplanes, one Martin bomber and one de Havilland under command of Lieutenant Col. Watson. It is also possible an eighth plane will be included carrying General Monahan, commandant at Mather Field.

This will be the first visit of an aeroplane fleet to Medford and a record breaking crowd will be on hand from all parts of the county.

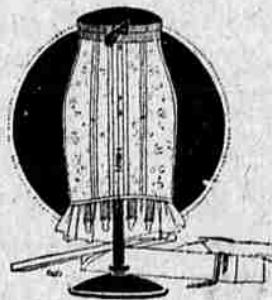
