

# FLYING CIRCUS TO SPLIT RANKS IN CITY FOR NORTH

MATHER FIELD, Sacramento, Cal., June 7.—Eleven officers and enlisted men will leave here early tomorrow on a flight to Portland, Ore., in eight army airplanes. The squadron is one of the largest that has ever been used on a long distance flight in the west. The aviators have arranged their schedule to land there in Portland June 10 in time to participate in the annual Rose Festival there. The aviators will follow practically the same route as Lieutenant A. F. Hoagland followed on his "trail blazing" flight several months ago. Stops will be made at Chico, Redding and Granada, in California. At Medford, Ore., the squadron will divide. The first section will make stops at Corvallis and Lebanon before reaching Portland, while the second will visit Roseburg, Eugene and Salem. A recruiting campaign will be conducted in conjunction with the flight.

The following men will participate: Colonel Henry L. Watson, commanding officer; First Lieutenants J. S. Krull, Frank D. Hackett, Earl Neubig and William McLean; Second Lieutenants Charles W. Schwartz, William Melt, Beck and J. M. Fetters; Sergeants Thomas Stromyer, John Milkowski and Charles A. LaJotte.
