At the adjourned meeting of the directors of the Commercial club held last evening plans for taking care of the 300 members of the National Editorial association, one-third of which will be women, on the trip to Crater Lake August 11 and 12, and for a view of the valley, was discussed at length and committees will be selected at once to carry out the plans. It will be a big undertaking but southern Oregon will receive more free advertising out of this than anything else that could be done and the editors and their wives must be given a fine trip. It will take 100 autos to convey the visitors to the lake and with the drivers will make a party of 400 or more.

Grants Pass, Ashland, Central Point, Eagle Point, Jacksonville and other towns of the valley, also ranchmen and farmers will be asked to furnish cars and the club believes there will be a ready response.

It will also take about \$1500 in cash to pay for gasoline, oil, entertainment, etc. Medford and the people of southern Oregon will have a chance to show their hospitality at this time to people from every part of the United States who are going to tell the story of this wonderful country and its attractions and the people here will prove equal to the occasion.

It was decided to join Grants Pass and Ashland in forming an organization to properly advertise the scenic wonders, fishing and hunting, as well as the other attractions and the

products of the orchard, farm etc., of southern Oregon. A booklet for general distribution over the United States will be issued in which each club will pay its proportionate share. There are many other ways of advertising and working for the interests of southern Oregon to be taken up by this organization.
