

### LOCAL AUTHORITIES HAD MURDERER IN GRASP, LET HIM GO

It has become known that Police-man Brownlee and Deputy Sheriff Withrow had a much wanted California murderer in their grasp last Thursday and after talking with him a few seconds let him go, not knowing until two days later of the murder and the fact that he was wanted.

The Medford police had received word to look out for a Hubbard, O., youth of 17 years with blue eyes and apprehend him. When the north bound passenger train arrived Thursday morning the two officers stopped a young man who alighted thinking that he was the Hubbard boy, but noticing that he had brown eyes they let him go, following his statement that he had just come from Weed.

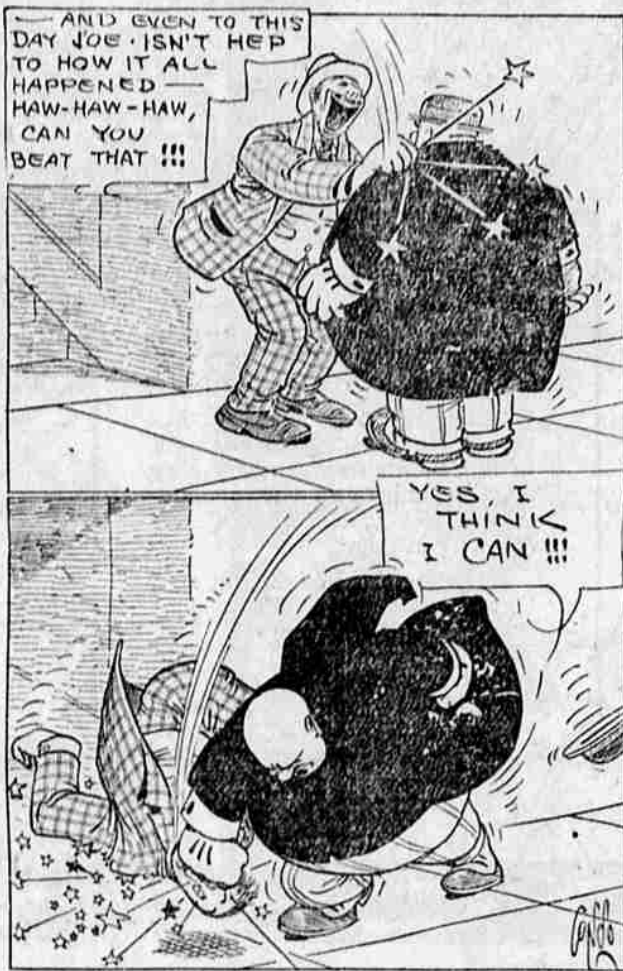
On Saturday a telegram was received at police headquarters at Weed from Deputy Sheriff J. N. Pyles of Bakersfield, Calif., who wired from Dunsmuir, Cal., asking that Roy Wolf, alias Roy Barry, aged 19 years, be arrested, if found, for the murder of a man named Greer, with whom he had gone riding in the latter's auto and killed with several blows on the head from a hammer. The description of the murderer answered perfectly that of the young man the two officers stopped here on Thursday.

Late Saturday night Pyles and another deputy sheriff from Bakersfield arrived from Dunsmuir in the very same blood bespattered auto in which the murder was committed, and related that they had tracked the suspect from Kern county to Weed, from which place he had proceeded north.

They related that after the murder the suspect had his blood soaked clothing to his mother in a town in Washington state. The deputy sheriffs left here in the auto Sunday for the Washington town, and felt sure they would capture their man in Portland or his home town.

### ILLINOIS FIRST TO RATIFY SUFFRAGE

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 10.—Illinois is the first state to ratify the woman suffrage constitutional amendment. The general assembly approved the measure today. The vote in the senate was unanimous while in the house the roll call was 132 to 3.

MADISON, Wis., June 10.—The Wisconsin legislature today ratified the federal suffrage amendment, the assembly voting 54 to 2 and the senate 23 to 1.
