

KUBLI EN ROUTE TO MEXICO, ABANDONED MACHINE IS FOUND

The first clew which has turned up since his disappearance from home with his wife and two children the day before he was to have had his preliminary hearing at Grants Pass on a charge of cattle stealing, leads the Jackson county authorities to believe that Harold Kubli, the young Applegate rancher, is either headed for Mexico, or has reached that country.

His automobile was found abandoned at La Moine, Calif., in Shasta county, the middle of last week. Sheriff Richardson of that county thinking it was a stolen machine, sent telegrams giving the engine and serial numbers to various cities, one of which was received by Chief of Police Timothy. The latter started tracing the car by these numbers and his investigation led to the fact that the car was formerly owned by William A. Ewing of this city, who traded it in to the Auto Exchange which on May 1st, sold it to Kubli who made only one payment and still owes several hundred dollars on the car.

This was the first trace of Kubli since his disappearance. The authorities of Josephine and Jackson counties did not even have any idea in which direction Kubli had gone, but were of the opinion that he had gone to Portland where he had relatives. Much telegraphing and wiring to the police through Oregon and California failed to discover Kubli's whereabouts.

The authorities here have been confident and still are that Kubli will be eventually captured if in this country from his description, as he has a disfigured face, having been kicked in the face by a horse when a boy. But they figure if he gets across the Mexican border he will never return, at least until the present case blows over.

"the treaty shall be so drawn as to permit any nation to reserve without prejudice to itself for future separate and full consideration by its people the question of any League of Nations," but that the obligations of Germany and her co-belligerents under the treaty shall not be thereby affected.

The Knox resolution also would declare it the policy of the United States government "in order to meet fully and fairly our obligations to ourselves and to the world that the freedom and peace of Europe being again threatened by any power or combination of powers, the United States will regard such a situation with grave concern as a menace to its own peace and freedom."

In such an event the Knox resolution proposes that "the United States will consult with other powers affected with a view to devising means for the removal of such menace and will, the necessity arising in the future, carry out the same complete accord and co-operation with our chief co-belligerents for the defense of civilization."

RETURNS FROM WAR FINDS FAMILY DEAD HAIR TURNS WHITE

CHEYENNE, Wyo., June 10—Sergeant J. W. Roberts, formerly of Des Moines, has white hair today, tho he is not out of his twenties. Roberts recently was discharged from the army at Fort Russell, in eighteen months overseas, he participated in seven battles and was wounded in each, receiving five rifle wounds in the legs. On top of all this, he came home to find that his father, mother, wife and two children had succumbed to the influenza during the epidemic last winter. Now he is working with the Union Pacific railroad company here as a crossing watchman.

HEAD OF GERMAN NAVY IN LAST PART WAR IS DEAD

BERLIN, June 9.—The death was announced today of Admiral Von Holtzendorff, head of the German general naval staff during the latter part of the war. He retired in August of last year.

MINING EXPERTS HERE TO STUDY LOCAL SITUATION

The Oregon Bureau of Mines has a corps of engineers in Medford who are making a complete and exhaustive examination of the mineral prospects and properties in this district. The purpose of the bureau is to assist in mine development, and place mining properties upon a paying basis. A specially constructed truck, equipped for sampling, assaying, surveying and map making is being used by the party consisting of G. E. Stowell, engineer and metallurgist, George Daugherty, mining geologist, W. H. Whittier, assayer and surveyor, and C. M. Swartley, assistant.

Mr. Stowell is making his headquarters in this city, and anyone desiring to communicate with him can do so by addressing a letter to him with a Medford address. The Jacksonville district is now being examined, the Opp mine being the first property inspected. In every case a report of the investigation is made to the owner of the property and also placed on file at the bureau of mines for public inspection. The coming of the party has aroused great interest among the mining men and it is believed the work will materially stimulate mining activity in this part of the state. After completing their work here the party will go to Grants Pass.
