FARMERS SPOKANE DISCUSS PROBLEMS BEFORE THE WORLD

SPOKANE, Wash., June 11.—The farmers' part in the peace conference was to be discussed by Charles S. Barrett, president of the National Farmers' Union who recently returned from abroad, at the opening session here today of the Northwest Farmers' conference. Dr. W. J. Spillman, editor of an eastern farm journal and former director of the division of farm management of the department of agriculture was to discuss "farm organization, farm management and the cost of production."

Gifford Pinchot, former chief forester of the United States and now president of the Pennsylvania Rural Progress association, today telegraphed A. A. Elmore of the Washington Farmers' Union that he would be unable to attend the conference. He was to have appeared on today's program.

A campaign in favor of the bill introduced in the senate by United States Senator Poindexter of Oregon, to prevent a greater charge for a short freight haul than for a longer haul over the same route was to be discussed in the conference today. It was announced by President Elmore.

Altho registration for the conference was only getting under way today, it was stated that prospects for a large attendance of farmers from Washington, Oregon, Idaho and western Montana were good.

WIRE STRIKE IS CALLED.

Portland Postal Quits
PORTLAND, June 11.—Practically all the day force of commercial telegraphers of the Postal Telegraph company went out on strike today. All the messenger force also went on strike at 10 o'clock. The Western Union company, on the other hand, had lost but two operators due to the strike, at noon. These were women operators in branch offices. The Western Union messengers had not joined the walk out at that hour.

Ten or twelve Western Union operators of the night shift were said to have signed up to join the strike, and to have declared they would not report for duty tonight.

C. P. Preston, deputy president of the Commercial Telegraphers' Union here, stated he had reports that the Western Union offices at Corvallis, Ore., and Centralia, Wash., were closed today by the strike of employes there. These reports were denied by the Western Union officials.

NEW YORK, June 11.—Reports from the seven divisions of the Western Union Telegraph company throughout the United States and the maritime provinces showed a full force of operators on duty two hours after the Commercial Telegraphers' Union strike order had gone into effect, Newcomb Carlton, president of the company, announced today.

WASHINGTON, June 11.—Union leaders claimed that about 1,300 or 95 per cent of the forces employed by the Western Union and Postal Telegraph companies here walked out today in compliance with the strike order.

CHICAGO, June 11.—The nationwide strike of union commercial telegraphers, called by S. J. Koenekamp, international president of the Commercial Telegraphers' Union of America, became effective at 7 o'clock this morning (Central time).

The companies against which the strike is called include the Western Union Telegraph company, the American Telegraph and Telephone company, and a number of smaller telegraph companies in various parts of the country.

Union officials say that 60,000 telegraphers would leave their keys during the day, and that on June 16 more than 100,000 electrical workers would join the strike. Western Union officials said that only a few of

their employes were members of the union, and that business over their lines would not be materially affected.

The issues involved in the strike include the right to organize and bargain collectively, wages and working conditions. President Koenekamp has established headquarters here.

At a meeting of the telegraphers early this morning "peaceful picketing" was decided upon and at 7 o'clock pickets were placed around the general offices of the companies in the city.

Leased wire operators were not involved in the strike.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 11.—"We haven't lost a man," Western Union officials said here today in response to queries as to the number of telegraphers who had obeyed the strike order. The officials added that they expected the strike order on the Pacific coast to be generally disregarded.

Postal Telegraph company officials said that of the seven men composing the late night shift, six quit their posts early today. Employees of the Federal Telegraph company, which operates only on the Pacific coast was not affected by the strike. Previous reports said the Federal company had agreed to meet the wage demands, but no official confirmation was forthcoming. Their employees were at work today.
