

MEDFORD BOY NOW A GENERAL GIVEN HIGHEST HONORS

WASHINGTON, June 14.—Brigadier General Amos A. Fries, chief of the chemical warfare service throughout the war with Germany, and for more than three years identified with some of the greatest engineering projects in Oregon, has had conferred upon him high honors by both the French and British governments.

His distinguished services with the American expeditionary forces caused the French government to decorate him with the cross of the commander of the Legion of Honor, while the British decoration is the cross of the Companion of St. Michaels and St. George.

General Fries, who is now commander at Edgewood arsenal, Maryland, was appointed to West Point military academy from Medford, Ore., by Representative Binger Hermann in 1894, and had charge of some of the earliest construction on the Cello canal in Columbia river.

General Fries is a brother of Mrs. W. T. Grieve and is well known in Medford, where he lived several years. His mother, Mrs. A. L. Fries spent last summer in the city. General Fries is a graduate of the Medford high school.

SPRUCE DIVISION TO SELL LARGE LIST OF SUPPLIES

PORTLAND, June 14.—Announcement is made here by the United States Spruce Production corporation that bids will be called for on September 2 on its extensive railroad, sawmill and timber properties of the Pacific northwest and is expected to prove of interest to lumbermen all over the United States.

With lumber now being produced in the greatest volume in the history of this territory, prices at their highest point and an enormous demand, curiosity has been expressed by lumbermen as to how the government sawmill properties, built last year to increase airplane lumber production, would be put in commercial operation.

The sawmills to be disposed of consist of one at Port Angeles, Wash. on the Olympic Peninsula, with a daily capacity of 40,000 feet board measure, and a mill at Toledo, Lincoln county, Oregon, with a daily capacity of 250,000 feet. Both have transcontinental railconnections and enjoy Pacific coast terminal rates. They also have water transportation facilities. Tributary to the two mills, the government spruce officials point out, are two of the largest hitherto undeveloped forest areas in the north west and to accomplish the full development of the properties, the government has constructed some 75 miles of standard main line railroad with additional spurs partly constructed and graded. The railroads are to be offered for sale with the sawmills.

In addition to the mills and railway lines, the Spruce Production corporation is offering a timber tract of more than 12,500 acres on one of the railroads in southern Lincoln county on the Oregon coast, which contains about 800 million board feet of fir and spruce, with some hemlock and cedar. This was bought by the government due to its adaptability for airplane stock.

SECOND INCOME TAX IS DUE JUNE 15

PORTLAND, Ore., June 14.—Collector of internal revenue, Milton A. Miller, has sent out notices to all taxpayers who failed to pay the full amount of the 1918 income tax on March 15th, calling attention to the second payment falling due June 15th, 1919. These notices were sent to the addresses given in the income tax return as filed. Where the taxpayer has moved from the address given in the return, failure to receive notice would not be accepted as an excuse for delinquency.

As June 15th falls on Sunday, remittances received in the collector's office before the close of business June 16th, will be considered as paid on time, and no penalties therefor will attach. Heavy penalties are imposed by statute for delinquency in payment of income tax and every taxpayer should be sure that the amount due by him is duly paid, as default means that the balance of the tax immediately becomes due and penalties for delinquency automatically attach.

TRANSFER AMERICAN SHIPS TO FRANCE

PARIS, June 14.—Orders placed in American shipyards for a half million tons of merchant ships to go under the French flag have been approved by Edward N. Hurley, chairman of the United States shipping board.

Notification also was given by Mr. Hurley that 200,000 tons of shipping ordered by France in June, 1917, and now in service, will be transferred to France.

DISTRIBUTE BLUE TRIANGLE SIGNS IN THE VALLEY

The Blue Triangle signs, which the Rogue River Fruit and Produce Association are erecting in some of the very finest orchards in the valley are an absolutely new feature in the fruit business in the northwest. It has been the policy of the management of the association to do everything possible to build up the quality of their Blue Triangle fruit, which today is recognized on all the world's markets as the premier fruit sold.

It seems fair that some recognition should be made to the orchards which are really producing the Blue Triangle fruit and this method is meeting with unanimous approval of the orchardists. The Blue Triangle signs are the property of the association and are loaned to the different orchardists after careful inspection of their fruit and is a guarantee that the quality is being maintained.

The number of triangles to be put out is limited to fifty, so only the fifty best orchards in the Rogue river valley can display this emblem. There is a lot of competition for the emblems and it will be necessary for the lucky orchardists to keep their quality on a A-1 basis. The association is putting out the emblems as rapidly as possible, but there is a good deal of work entailed in making certain that the orchards where they are to go are entitled to them.

FRENCH JOURNALIST CONDEMNED TO DIE

PARIS, June 13.—Gaston Rontier, a prominent French journalist, was today sentenced to death by court martial for imparting military intelligence to the enemy. Rontier, who is a socialist with extreme tendencies, was tried by default. He was charged with having agreed with German agents in Spain to start a French language paper there during the war for the purpose of carrying on Germanophile propaganda.

Gaston Rontier founded the Madrid LaPaix in 1917. It was believed that Bolo Pashin, who was executed at Paris in 1918 for treason, furnished the funds for the establishment of the newspaper.

CANCEL FIGHT TRAINS TO CARRY SOLDIERS

WASHINGTON, June 14.—So as not to interfere with the transportation of soldiers now returning from France in ever-increasing numbers, Director General Hines today ordered that railroad equipment for excursion and recreation purposes be limited to an absolute minimum. Among permits for special equipment cancelled was one for seventy coaches and Pullmans to be operated by the New York Central from New York to accommodate persons who wished to see the Willard-Dempsey fight July 4th.
