5 RURAL SCHOOLS JACKSON COUNTY GET STATE PRIZES

One notification in connection with the awards, meeting these requirements this year, is that the teachers who are at the head of these schools, all live in the districts where they teach, and some of them have taught for a number of years in the same communities.

PRESBYTERIANS TO MEET IN EUGENE JULY 15TH TO 23D

The Synod of Oregon of the Presbyterian church will meet in Eugene, Ore., July 15 to 23, holding most of the sessions at the University. In the spirit of the new era a great advance step is taken this year in the synod by holding an eight day session of exceptional educational value. Every Presbyterian church in the state is represented in the synod by its ministers and elders and over 200 delegates are expected.

Special instructors have been engaged for valuable courses, in addition to the instructors of the University Summer school. Among those secured by the synod to give addresses and conduct study courses are Rev. Sibus Evans, president of Occidental college; Rev. W. R. King, of First Presbyterian church of St. Louis, Mo.; Rev. W. E. Finley, of the Church and Country Life Department of the Presbyterian church; Rev. George Fraeker of the Sunday school board, and Rev. Edgar P. Hill of the General education board of the Presbyterian church. All morning sessions will be devoted to inspirational addresses and educational courses, and business sessions will be held in the afternoon. A recreation period will occur at 4 p. m. each day, a social meeting every evening at 7:30 p. m. and a social hour at 8:30 p. m.

CALIFORNIA G. O. P. ASKS NOMINATION SENATOR JOHNSON

SAN FRANCISCO, June 16.—A resolution recommending to the republican national convention that it nominate United States Senator Hiram W. Johnson for president of the United States was adopted at a special conference here Saturday of all branches of the republican party in the state, in Johnson's behalf.

The number of pupils revealed by the last school census was 1320, the enrollment for the current year being 1061, including the superintendent, the total number of teachers is 34.

A recapitulation of the items in the budget for the year 1919-20, may be of interest, and is as follows: the chief item as to income being the local school tax amounting to \$29,000, implying a levy of 9.7 mills on a valuation approximating \$3,000,000. Other sources of income were from state school revenue, \$2,180; county school tax, \$10,250; county high school fund, \$3,500; total, \$44,930. Among budget appropriations, teachers salaries require \$29,350 to which amount there has been added about \$3,000, due to the high cost of teaching, in line with salary increases in every other vocation, an excess which will be provided for in due season, probably in the way of an extra mill tax, in the event economies along other channels do not suffice. Further expenditures include debt reduction and interest, \$6,250; fuel, light and power, \$4,130; janitors, \$2,300; supplies and repairs, \$2,900.

The board has adopted the plan of military training in the high school. Theoretically this training is supposed to be compulsory but it remains to be seen, under certain circumstances, whether the soft pedal might not be applied in behalf of easing the prejudices of "conscientious objectors." This training is not intended to encourage the military spirit, but does imply "preparedness." Furthermore it is a most exemplary form of discipline and is the right hand supporter of athletic development. However, the board's action is simply preliminary to and contingent upon future arrangements according to plans being worked out. To those who raise the objection as to additional expense, it is only necessary to add that the federal government meets this proposition to the extent of providing the equivalent for salary of an extra instructor and certain incidentals.

Today the Ashland district is choosing a director. Ordinarily a school election here creates about as little interest as can be imagined, but in connection with this event the issues are stirring in some lively criticism and campaigning. In fact a prominent citizen asserts that the struggle has assumed the triangular phase of a "parent-teacher-church-library fight."

BETTER SHIP SERVICE MAY LOWER COFFEE

NEW YORK, June 16.—The joint coffee trade commission, representing the green coffee merchants and roasters of the United States, today sent out to more than 500 wholesale dealers throughout the country copies of a letter to Edward N. Hurley, chairman of the United States shipping board, urging prompt establishment of the proposed new government steamship service between North and South America. Better shipping facilities, it was said, would contribute toward bringing about a reduction in coffee prices.

The letter pointed out that coffee constituted the greater part of the freight tonnage from Brazil and Colombia to this country, the imports for 12 months ending June 1 totaling 1,091,000,000 pounds.
