WARN MORMONS TO LEAVE CHIHUAHUA BEFORE TOO LATE

JUAREZ, Mex., June 21.—Americans were warned to leave the Mormon district of Western Chihuahua "When the crisis arrives," by General Manuel Diezuez, commander of the northern military zone, according to a telegram received last night by American Consul Dow from American Consul Stewart at Chihuahua City.

The message stated that General Diezuez considered the withdrawal of the Americans from the Casas Grandes Mormon district advisable until such a time that he could send troops into that district to protect the Americans. The warning was referred to the American state department.

Mormon church officials here consider it impracticable for the 630 Mormons living in the Casas Grandes district to leave their homes at this time and consider it improbable that another exodus, similar to those of 1912 and 1914, will result in a general looting of the colonies.

General Diezuez also informed the American consul at Chihuahua City that his bombing planes were ready to take the field and that a column would be started north at once to engage Villa.

EL PASO, Tex., June 21.—Villa has given instructions to his men to attack none of the small federal garrisons occupying towns and settlements along the Mexican side of the border, according to information received here today from the field in Mexico.

POINDEXTER NOW ENJOYS BOOM

SAN FRANCISCO, June 21.—United States Senator Miles Poindexter of Washington state, was named here today in a country wide boom by telegraph for president of the United States in 1920. The boom was launched by S. A. Perkins of Tacoma, member of the republican national committee, and a newspaper publisher of the Pacific northwest.

Perkins also announced that east republicans would join with the republicans of California in an endeavor to have the republican national convention next year held in San Francisco, and will offer, free a special train to bring the national committee and their staff assistants to this city from Chicago and take them back.

RUSSIAN CRUISER SUNK BY BRITISH U-BOAT

LONDON, June 21.—The Russian cruiser Oleg was sunk Wednesday by a British submarine, it is announced in a Russian wireless dispatch received today.

The sinking occurred near the Tolbuchan lighthouse.
