REVENGE DEATH OF GEN. BLANQUET BY KILLING PASSENGERS

VERA CRUZ, Mexico.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.) The death of seventy-five passengers was one phase of the revenge taken by the rebel bands under the nominal command of Felix Diaz for the death of Aureliano Blanquet and Francisco Alvarez.

A train on the Interoceanic line, bearing passengers being armed only with instruments of labor was derailed between Pina and Las Vigas, the greater number of the passengers killed by rifle fire and their bodies, together with the living wounded, burned when the train was fired.

Within a few days a party of bandits, commanded by the Arellano brothers, burned a large part of the village of Tlapacoyan, causing an undetermined number of casualties. Another attack by Pedro Gabay, falsely reported killed, on the Alvarado railway near Salinas, claimed fifteen passengers and fifteen soldiers as victims.

The only military success registered was the attack on a military train near Tierra Blanca, on the Isthmus railway, at a point known as "Devil's Backbone," by forces under the rebel leaders, Villagas and Lagunes. The young General Ernesto Dany, Major Cirilo Gamba and fifty soldiers were killed. Many fighting to the last.

FEDERATION WILL DISCIPLINE UNION DISOBEYS ORDERS

ATLANTIC CITY, June 23.—The labor convention here today adopted a resolution changing the American Federation of Labor constitution so as to permit disciplinary action against unions showing radical tendencies. The executive council may revoke the charter of any central union or body of delegates which calls a strike or attempts to take a strike vote which would, if successful, cause a walk-out of affiliated bodies. James Duncan, of Seattle, said it made no difference whether this change was wrought in constitution or not, adding that a central body wanted to take action it would do so regardless of constitutions and rules. This sentiment was endorsed by "Curley" Grow of Los Angeles.

Another resolution denounced "deplorable conditions" in the railway mail service and asked that congress pass laws providing for a standard day for railway mail clerks.
