

NATIONAL EDITORS TO VISIT ASHLAND ON RETURN TRIP

ASHLAND, June 25.—Members of the National Editorial Association will visit Ashland on August 12, upon return of the party from Crater Lake. The editors who come from all parts of the country will be given a reception here, including a dinner in the park, and their visit will be made an occasion of particular significance.

The last of the week two cars from Selma, Cal., passed through here bound for the Blue river section of Lane county, the two families being mutual friends. One car contained the Christianson family, the other a family by the name of Throssel, with whom two young children of the Christianson family were riding for the time being. 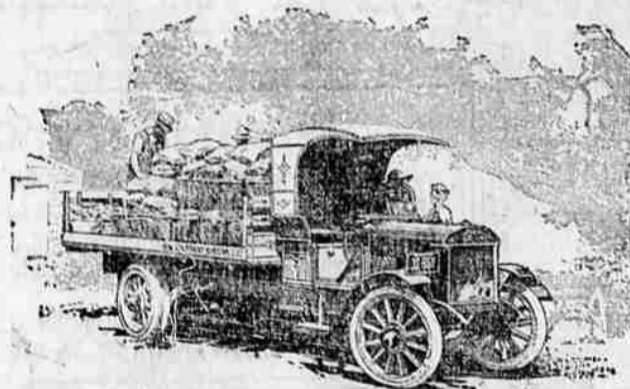

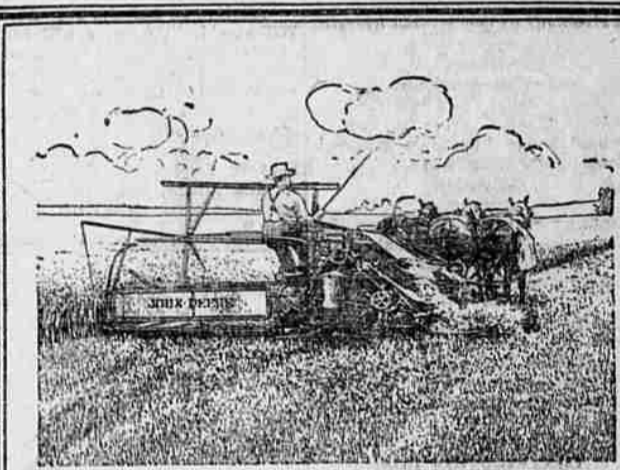
