J. W. Merritt of Gold Hill was a business visitor in Central Point during the week.

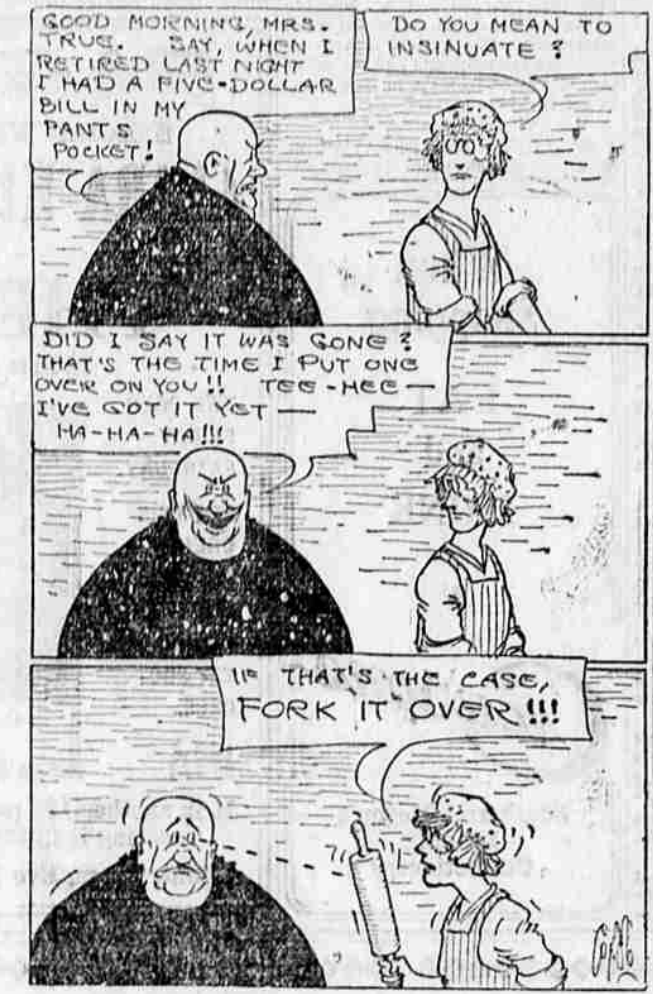
