RIGHT OF BREWERS TO MANUFACTURE 2 PER CENT IS HIT

NEW YORK, June 26.—The United States circuit court of appeals in an opinion handed down today modified the injunction recently granted brewers by Federal Judge Mayer against United States District Attorney Caffey and Acting Internal Revenue Collector McElligott. The opinion of the higher court permits the prosecutor to proceed against alleged violators of the war time prohibition act.

NEW YORK, June 26.—The right of brewers to manufacture and sell "2.75 per cent beer" after July 1 is not assured by today's decision of the United States circuit court of appeals modifying the injunction against United States District Attorney Caffey and Acting Internal Revenue Collector McElligott, according to United States Assistant District Attorney Cornelius J. Smyth, one of the drafters of the government's brief in the pending litigation.

Mr. Smyth characterized as "optimistic" a statement by counsel for the brewers that the latter could continue manufacturing beer of the prescribed alcoholic content. The decision, he pointed out, would not exempt brewers from prosecution under the war time prohibition act.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—The house judiciary committee voted today to split prohibition legislation into three parts, with enforcement of war time prohibition separate and distinct from the others, which relate to constitutional prohibition and the manufacturer's of industrial alcohol.

U. S. CHAMBER OF COMMERCE WILL VISIT THE COAST

SAN FRANCISCO, June 26.—The board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States will meet in Seattle during July, according to advices received here today by the local Chamber of Commerce. No definite date was mentioned.

According to the message, the party will consist of 34 members of the chamber. They will visit Chicago, Denver, Salt Lake and California points before proceeding to Seattle.

Edward A. Filene, of Boston, who was a member of the Taft party on its trip in connection with the League of Nations advocacy, will accompany the party.
