

# BASEBALL WILL BE BIG FEATURE ASHLAND RODEO

ASHLAND, June 27.—System will mark arrangements during the celebration epoch in every particular. A notable improvement will be commodious space adjacent to roundup grounds for the parking of cars, a ten-acre tract having been reserved for this specific purpose. Three fine strings of horses have been secured for the relay races, the men's purse being \$300, and the girls' purse \$250. Baseball will also figure among events in the regular schedule of amusements, Klamath Falls and Grants Pass teams being among the clubs present, games to occur four days. The jazz dance platform now being erected is double the size of any heretofore constructed, and will accommodate 300 couple at a single jazz. No less than 10 water events will take place at the Nat, some of them thrillers in the way of high dives, etc. Shower, sprinkling, immersion, or plunge features are available. The grand stand will easily accommodate 10,000 people. Chariot races will take place, staged after hippodrome methods, and Nero will look on during the Roman struggle. In this instance, "Nero" refers to the champion ringster bull, a familiar old timer in round up contests.

Funeral services of the late Lennor A. Neil, who died suddenly in this city on Tuesday evening, will be held in the Elks Temple, on Wednesday, July 2, delay in arrangements being due to waiting for arrival of near relatives from a distance. The deceased was 70 years of age and was a native of Tennessee, the son of Claiborne Neil, early pioneer in this valley. He was a brother of the late Judge Neil of Jacksonville, and of Mrs. J. R. Tozer of this city. Other brothers and sisters still living are Robert P. Neil, and Mrs. Gertrude Murphy of Ashland; Jefferson and William Neil, of northern Oregon; Mrs. Jennie Alford of Klamath Falls, and Mrs. Mary Dean, whose family home was formerly at Grants Pass. He leaves four children, the sons being Elmo and Jesse who live in this vicinity; Mrs. Edna Torrence, of Springfield, Mass.; and Mrs. Annie King, of Newark, New Jersey. Mrs. Neil died several years ago. Lennor Neil's presence in this vicinity was a familiar one, he having resided hereabouts for over half a century, actively engaged in the business of rancher and stockman.

Phil Metchan, Sr., well known resident of Portland, and connected with the Imperial hotel, and who has relatives living in Ashland, is reported seriously ill with slight hopes of recovery.
