

CLAIMS TOWNLEY WAS A DEFENDER OF RED FLAG

JACKSON, Minn., June 27.—James E. Gillespie, a banker from Stillwater, Minn., testifying today at the trial of A. C. Townley and Joseph Gilbert, Non-Partisan League leaders, accused of seditious conspiracy, declared that Townley in a political speech at Stillwater on February 19 of this year, defended the red flag and declared that it was the emblem of the oppressed.

Townley was in court when Gillespie testified. "I do not remember a great deal of Townley's speech," testified Mr. Gillespie. "For some time I enjoyed it. Then he took a different turn. He said there was a bill in Minnesota to prohibit the use of the red flag and he said he knew only one animal that took exception to the flag and that animal was enclosed in a fence. He said that the Russian administration was being carried on successfully and that was their flag.

"At this point a Russian Jew, Isadore Lott, a respected resident of Stillwater, interrupted. Lott said he took exception to the red flag statement and declared that the American flag was good enough for him, Townley replied: "Is the speaker a Russian Jew?" The mayor interrupted and said, "Yes, he is, but he is an American citizen. He has two boys in the war."

"Lott then asked Townley: How many boys have you in the war?" "Townley got off the platform and that ended the meeting." Gillespie was cross examined by George Hoke, chief counsel for the defense. He sought to show that Townley referred to the red flag only in a humorous vein. Gillespie admitted that Townley did make humorous remarks in this connection but insisted that the Non-Partisan League president also seemed to be serious in his discussion. Gillespie stated that he had been a close friend of George H. Sullivan, who opposed the Non-Partisan League candidate in the special election held the day following the meeting at which Townley spoke.
