PRESIDENT'S FAREWELL TO FRANCE

PARIS, June 28.—President Wilson today on the eve of his departure from France made the following statement:

"As I look back over the eventful months I have spent in France my memory is not of conferences and hard work alone, but also of innumerable acts of generosity and friendship which have made me feel how genuine the sentiments of France are towards the people of America and how fortunate I have been to be the representative of our people in the midst of a nation which knows how to show us kindness with so much charm and so in such open manifestation of what is in its heart.

"Deeply happy as I am at the prospect of joining my own countrymen again, I leave France with genuine regret, my deep sympathy for her people and belief in her future confirmed, my thought enlarged by the privilege of association with her public men, conscious of more than one affectionate friendship formed and profoundly grateful for unstinted hospitality and for countless kindnesses which have made me feel welcome and at home.

"I take the liberty of bidding France Godspeed as well as good-bye and of expressing once more my abiding interest and entire confidence in her future. (Signed) "WOODROW WILSON."

U. S. LABOR READY TO HELP GERMANY IF SHE REFORMS

PHILADELPHIA, June 28.—The American Federation of Labor is ready to extend the helping hand to Germany if the Germans show themselves worthy," declared Samuel Gompers, president of the federation, in addressing today members of the organization at the launching of the steamer Afel, at the Hog Island shipyard. Mr. Gompers uttered his significant words on the eve of his return to Europe to continue the work of building up the shattered forces labor on the continent.

"To me this is an epoch-making event," said Mr. Gompers, "not only because of the purpose for which we are assembled, but also because of the signing of the peace treaty. At last the dawn of a new era has come, that for which you men labored in this greatest of shipyards, and it performed marvelous tasks in helping our government and those of its allies.

"We fought Germany, Austria, Bulgaria and Turkey, not from our desire to fight, but to rid their peoples of oppression from their masters and to give them an opportunity for self-expression.

"If our former enemies will but show themselves worthy we will be glad to extend to them the hand of fraternity.

"Remember that the ideals of the American Federation of Labor are synonymous with those of the government."

WILSON FELICITATED BY SECRETARY POLK

WASHINGTON, June 28.—Immediately after receiving the news of the signing of the treaty Acting Secretary Polk sent this message to the president over the special direct wire from the state department to Versailles:

"Permit me to offer my heartfelt congratulations on the completion of your great work. The American people will be ever proud of what you did as their representative for the peace of the world."

GAME WARDEN IN ALASKA COVERS A BEAT 1388 MILES

NENANA, Alaska. (By Mail.)—Thirteen hundred and eighty-eight miles by dog sled marks the trip just completed by Game Warden Stephen Foster, whose journeys carried him into the little known parts of the McKinley National park and other regions.

From Nenana to McGrath, on the Kuskokwin river, Foster traveled the 335 miles distance over country seldom visited, and over unbroken trails, his trip here alone indicating that the way of the game warden in Alaska is no sinecure. At McGrath a United States commissioner holds jurisdiction over a vast sweep of country where Foster found wholesale game violations. Fourteen white men were convicted and fined and the hunters required to cure and take care of the large quantities of wild meat found in caches in the mountains. In the states the unlucky hunter also would have lost his game, but up here the waste of good meat is considered almost as much a crime as the illegal slaughter of it.

In the Kantishna country, for instance, the warden found 74 quarters of caribou and the carcasses of a dozen cow moose in one cache. As there was no federal commissioner available, prosecutions were not in order, but the hunters were compelled to cure the meat.

Disease has made heavy inroads on the big game of the upper Kuskokwin, Warden Foster reported. A peculiar disease has attacked the moose and even arrested the growth of their horns, which in some cases, he found, were but the size of a man's hand. Mountain sheep were resorted to by the dozen with a disease known as lumb jaw. Forest fires in the district have driven the once large herds of caribou out in search of food. Large ingrating herds were seen making their way towards Lake Minchumina.

Nesting places of the grouse and other game birds have been widely destroyed as well by the fires, the warden said.

NEW PACIFIC FLEET TO SALE JULY 17

ARCHANGEL, Friday, June 27.—(By Associated Press.) The last of the American forces here, with the exception of Brigadier General W. P. Richardson, the American commander, and a small detachment of headquarters troops, embarked today for Brest. The forces which left were a battalion of the 310th engineers, before sailing, every officer of the battalion and twenty enlisted men were decorated by the Russian command for gallantry and efficiency.
