PEACE IS SIGNED.

PEACE is signed. The war is over. The most momentous day in modern history is here, Saturday, June 28, 1919! Our children and grand-children and great-great-grand-children will have this date drilled into them as we have had 1492, the fall of Constantinople and the signing of the Magna Charta.

Slight wonder the cannon boom in Paris, in London and far off Japan, for the human race is thrilled with the sense of a new world dawning. The significance of the moment surpasses the imagination and transcends human speech. Sufficient until the day is the glory thereof.

And yet upon sober contemplation there must be an undercurrent of serious doubt and apprehension. For after all the ceremony in Paris is only a ceremony. One might compare it with the signing of the marriage contract, with the joy and gaiety and jubilation inseparable from the occasion, but with its attendant solemnity, smiles glistening with tears,—the sudden emotional halt when one tries to grope the outlines of the future.

China did not sign the treaty. General Smuts signed under protest. The German delegates humiliated and broken, were not received as friends who had entered into a peaceful compact, but as potential enemies, who were observing a form, under compulsion, and could not be trusted to fulfil their obligations. As with the marriage ceremony, it is not the formal declarations, not the solemn vows and sacred protestations; it is the spirit within the hearts of the contracting parties, that decides the validity of that contract and the success of the future association.

What of the future? That is the unspoken sentiment of the sober, the mature and thoughtful world. And as in other momentous contract between individuals, so with any other momentous contract between nations, one falls back, rather foolishly perhaps, upon those elemental and simple sentiments,—hope that the future may be tranquil, and faith that the best will somehow be attained.

And with this somewhat feeble observation, let us ring the bells, fire the cannon, and shy the old shoes at the retreating carriage.

TY COBB LOSES FIRST PLACE TO YANKEE SLUGGER

CHICAGO, June 28.—Roger Peckinpaugh, New York, with an average of .395, has dethroned Ty Cobb, Detroit, for batting honors in the American League, according to averages reckoned today and which include games of last Wednesday. But Cobb has been out of the line up all week. As a result Veach, a team-mate, has worked up to a tie with the Georgian for second place with a mark of .355. Peckinpaugh broke the tie which he shared with Sisler, St. Louis, last week for runs scored and is in front now with 41 to his credit. Cobb's idleness enabled Roth, Philadelphia, to break the tie for total base honors. Roth has 107.

Guvvy Cravath, Philadelphia, by cracking out three home runs in a week, leads the home run department, broke the triple tie for total base honors shared by himself, Doyle and Kauff, New York, and continued leading National League batters who participated in 20 or more games. Cravath's average is .406, acquired on 62 hits, made in 47 games. Olson, Brooklyn, leads the run makers with 35.
