

TAKING OF 1920 CENSUS STARTED IN VALLEY TODAY

The decennial taking of the census began in Medford and Jackson county today as well as over the United States, and the people of this city and county are asked to treat the men and women who are taking the census with courtesy. The enumerators are paid ten cents for each name found in his or her district and a similar fee for each live stock animal, have only two weeks to do this work and hence must work going lively to finish in that time, as at many homes they will have to call several times, because of the absence of the inmates.

HOME DEMONSTRATOR FOR JACKSON COUNTY SPEAKS IN CORVALLIS

Miss Florence Poole, county demonstrator for Jackson county, is in attendance at the sessions of "Farmers' Week" at Agricultural college. On Tuesday afternoon she addressed the community life conference on "The Home Demonstration Agent's Share in Community Service." She emphasized the value of high ideals in the home for the boys and girls, also of neighborliness in passing around our knowledge. In bringing people together for the purposes of home demonstration they get to know each other better, and learn lessons of helpfulness, thus fostering the community spirit. She defined the duty of a home demonstration agent as being to make life happier for the farm woman, thus making farm life more attractive to girls, the mothers of the future. In Dakota Miss Poole said eight agents in that large state trained community leaders during the time of the food conservation and notable results were achieved, in a state where vegetables are difficult to grow and produce. Miss Poole's clear, unaffected style and subject matter made an excellent impression and former residents of Jackson county and the many farmers and their wives who listened to her excellent address are quite at a loss to understand the action of the Jackson county court in refusing to continue the home demonstration work, especially when such a competent agent is available.

WAR WORK COUNCIL LECTURES ARE GIVEN

Dr. Jennie Sharp of Philadelphia, Pa., who is lecturing on the subject of Social Health under the direction of the war-work council of the national board of the Young Women's Christian Association gave four addresses in Medford during the past three days. On Sunday afternoon she spoke to an interested audience of women at the First Methodist church. Mrs. E. H. Hurd and Mrs. Spriggs conducted the devotional exercises.

On Sunday evening Dr. Sharp occupied the pulpit of the Methodist Church South, and was cordially received by the pastor and congregation of that church.

On Monday afternoon at 2:30 the Greater Medford club listened to Dr. Sharp in the assembly room of the library and expressed great interest in the subject, as she presented it. The girls of the high school had the privilege of hearing Dr. Sharp on Tuesday afternoon. From Medford she goes to Red Bluff, Cal., and later to Pasadena.

The series of talks which were given in Medford completes the lecture schedule on the subject of Social Health planned and carried out by the war work council of the national board of the Y. W. C. A. Through the activities of this council women physicians, specially fitted for this work, have spoken before audiences numbering one million and a half of people. They have addressed audiences in every state in the country and have promoted a very definite and sane movement to safeguard the social and individual health of the members of all communities where the talks have been given.

AMERICANS VISITING BERLIN WONDER WHATS DOING ON BROADWAY


