It seems that the greatest damage was done during the recent low temperature to orchards that had been given the greatest care. Where fruit men had plowed deep and given special attention to cultivating their orchards, and to keeping the sap up in the trees, the zero weather, freezing the sap, did the damage. 2 NEW VEGETABLES DISCOVERED, BOTH RESEMBLE POTATO

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Jan. 5.—Two new vegetables have been propagated at the Missouri Botanical garden here. It was announced today by Dr. George T. Moore, director of the garden.

One has been named the "arracacha" and the other, the "dasheen." Both resemble the potato and are said to be about equal in food value to it.

Dr. Moore explained the arracacha, when cooked is a bit darker than the sweet potato and tastes like the parsnip. It is a round grower, he said.

Dasheens cooked in cream taste like cauliflower and when baked have the flavor of a roasted chestnut, Dr. Moore said.

The announcement was made to delegates who attended the convention for the American Association for the Advancement of Science, which ended last night and who remained over in St. Louis for today.

WOMEN PARADE ON BEHALF OF I. W. W. UPHELD BY COURT

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.—Cheers and handclapping greeted the action of Magistrate Corrihan today in dismissing charges of disorderly conduct against three women arrested Christmas day while attempting to parade in Fifth avenue in a demonstration for the release of "political prisoners." The defendants were Miss Gladys Griner, daughter of John P. Griner of Baltimore, a member of the United States railroad commission to Russia; Dr. Gertrude Kelly and Miss Mary Duffy.

Magistrate Corrihan rapped for order when the court room demonstration started but it only increased in volume.

Magistrate Corrihan declared he disagreed with the contention of the prosecuting attorney that the signs "free political prisoners" carried by the women warranted a charge of disorderly conduct. The policeman who arrested Miss Griner as she was mounting the steps of a church with one of the placards in her hand was characterized as "too officious," by the magistrate. No one but the policeman objected to her action, her counsel said, and a church sign bore the words, "all welcome."

nor made or sold as a beverage is intoxicating. *

"That the federal government would, in attempting to enforce a prohibitory law be confronted with difficulties similar to those encountered by the states is obvious; and both this experience of the states and the need of the federal government of legislation defining intoxicating liquors as was done in the Volstead act was clearly set forth in the reports of the house judiciary committee. Furthermore * * * the attorney general calling attention specifically to the claim made in respect to the 2.75 per cent beer, had pointed out to congress that definition of intoxicating liquor by fixed standards was essential to effective enforcement of the prohibition law. It is therefore clear both that congress might reasonably have considered some legislative definition of intoxicating liquor to be essential to enforcement of prohibition and also that the definition provided by the Volstead act was not an arbitrary one.

Police Powers of State "The police power of a state over the liquor traffic is * * * a single broad power to make such laws by way of prohibition, as may be re-

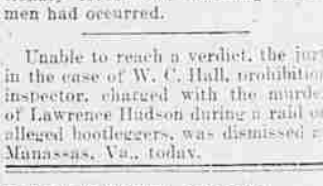
