JAPAN WILL KEEP CONTROL SHANTUNG SAYS PROF. REIMER

"I believe Japan will keep her promise to President Wilson," said Professor F. C. Reimer, director of the Talent experiment station, who returned Sunday from China where he continued his research work in the effort to secure a pear tree resistant to fire blight. "But I doubt if that will mean any radical change in the administration of affairs in Shantung. Japan has agreed not to impair Chinese sovereignty, and will draw troops whenever condition so warrant, but she will continue to have economic control, control over railroads and harbors and as long as this is true, China will to all intents and purposes be little more than a vassal."

"I was much interested in the Shantung question and while in China talked with people of all nationalities, missionaries, commercial travelers, agents, students, professors, and I did not find a single white man who did not consider the award of German rights in Shantung to Japan a mistake."

"Japan of course realizes that the award is unpopular with both American and European, and so will be ever careful to keep faith as far as the letter of her promises to President Wilson are concerned, but in my opinion, and the opinion of well informed people throughout the Orient, she will never relinquish the commercial hold acquired in Shantung, unless superior force should compel her to do so."

"Of course if things were equal, China would force out the Japanese for naturally the Chinaman is a better business man, more industrious and more economical. But the Japanese is more crafty and far more unscrupulous. In Shantung, for example, with the control of the best harbor on the coast of Tsing Taos, and the only railroad in her possession, Chinese goods simply won't be moved, and Japan will have a monopoly. This is not only my opinion, it is the opinion of practically everyone living in the far east, who has studied the situation."

Professor Reimer returns with what is undoubtedly the most complete collection of ornamental pears in the world. He has also found several species which are practically immune from blight, and by using this type for the root and branch structure, and grafting with the more edible Bartlett, Bose, or Anjou, it is believed that a pear will be evolved which will not be affected by blight. Professor Reimer is also interested in creating a new species of pear tree entirely by a process of cross fertilization, using the Chinese and American varieties, which would produce a commercial pear, suitable for the table and free from blight infection.

Professor Reimer's experiments and discoveries are of far reaching importance, pear growers in all parts of the country being intensely interested in them. In the near future Professor Reimer will give a lecture on his experiences in China and the result of his research work to date.

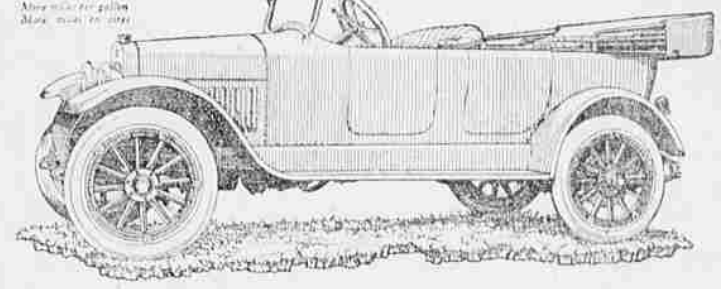
