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MEN WANTED FOR CHEMICAL SERVICE IN U. S. FORCES

Our new peace time army has a unit now known as the chemical warfare service that was authorized in October 1917, just a little more than a year after poisonous gas had been introduced for the first time in modern warfare by the Germans.

It is desired to obtain as soon as possible for this new branch of the service 1348 good men—chemists, chemical workers, powder men, technicians, makers, gas workers, skilled mechanics, pipelayers, boiler makers, electricians, firemen and men with engineering experience are needed.

These enlistments are for one or three years, previous service not necessary. All men, upon enlistment, will be forwarded to Lakehurst Proving Ground, Lakehurst, N. J., immediately, which is just 72 miles south of New York city.

A FEW WORDS FROM SAM BLYTHE.

THERE is nothing soft about Sam Blythe. Sam shed his political pin feathers a quarter of a century ago. When Sam says something,—and he can write more and say less than any other high-priced ink slinger in the business,—there is good reason to believe there is something besides hot air and up-lift behind it.

In other words when Sam doesn't know what the people are thinking he says so, in nothing less than 20,000 words,—5 off for cash. Sam's reputation is too valuable to take any chances. But when he says something tangible and to the point, it's a pretty safe bet, that he does know what they are thinking.

All of which leads to the point that Sam in the last Saturday Evening Post urges the American people to wake up, throw over the old time professional politicians in both parties and choose a presidential candidate for themselves. Sam, moreover, must have seen the Mail Tribune for he seems favorably disposed to Mr. Herbert Hoover.

Here is an extract which makes the point as well as any other portion of the article which needless to say is long enough to provide Sam with spending money until the Chicago convention.

What can be said in defense of that national intelligence when we discover that the average American, in whose hands not only the election but the nomination of the next president rests, is apparently paying not the slightest attention to the presidential politics of the present day? What can be said in praise of a national intelligence that allows the old-time political bosses, the machine men of the two great parties, to proceed in exactly the same manner they have proceeded for years in the work of picking out candidates for president? Does not the average American deserve exactly what he will get unless he takes a hand in this important matter? Is he not responsible individually for the result?

From time to time there have appeared in the Saturday Evening Post during the past year articles setting forth accurately the phases and procedures of the proceedings of the old gangs of politicians as to the presidential nominations for 1920. It has been shown, without contradiction or denial that the old gang is at work with the old-time political bosses to pick out the presidential candidates for 1920. These men have operated for many years, the Democrats of the old-guard, are nominating for president a man who has operated in the same manner, in exactly the same way, as the Democrats, and who will operate with them, as a Republican, in the same manner as the Democrats. Their organizations—rather than the Republican can first and a Republican afterward.

Similarly, it is well enough known that the Old Gang of the democratic party, the Bourbons of Democracy, are planning to nominate a man for president in 1920 whose greatest claim to that nomination will be exactly as set forth above, except that he, if elected, will be democratic in his tendencies and operations and affiliations instead of republican. There has been no change in the Old Guard of the republican party, nor has there been any change in the Old Gang of the democratic party; and it is credulity to the point of simple mindedness to think there will be any change in the character or affiliations of the man either the Old Guard or the Old Gang will nominate if they have the opportunity.
